The last half century has witnessed a  
striking development and growth  
of fraternal societies and unions of vari-  
ous kinds. Not that they are themselves,  
in any sense modern institutions, for we  
find that they existed in the Roman Empire  
before the Christian Era. Then when the  
Church became powerful she took them  
under her protection, introducing au-  
thority in them a religious element of  
brotherly love and fellowship which was  
not found among the heathen; and in the  
middle ages these guilds or livery

son of St. Peter's Cathedral Before  
The Members of the Sons of  
England Society.**

companies, as they came to be called,  
exercised a widespread influence both on  
the continent of Europe and in England.  
Each trade and profession had its own  
society which regulated business matters,  
aided sick and needy members, and  
protected the interest of all. They frequ-  
ently had their own churches or chapels  
under the dedication of their patron  
saints, and also built stately guild halls  
as places of meetings.

In the present day there are in London,  
nearly one hundred such livery compan-  
ies, which virtually control the city,  
since the Lord Mayor is chosen annually  
from two candidates nominated by  
these guilds, which also elect the sheriff  
and the chamberlain.

But these medieval associations were  
exclusive. They would admit into  
their ranks none but members of their  
own craft. They were essentially trades  
unions composed of both employers and  
employed, of one calling, and no one out-  
side that calling was eligible for ad-  
mission. Later, however, we find cer-  
tain of these societies removing such  
restrictions and throwing open their doors  
to a larger membership. The Masonic  
Order, for example, is no longer confined  
to masons and builders, and the Foresters  
are foresters--now on y in name.

And modern conditions of life have  
called into existence a host of other  
fraternal societies. The ever present  
conflict between capital and labor has  
produced numerous trades unions,--  
not as they were of old, composed of  
master and man, the employer and the  
employed, but solely of employees banded  
together to protect themselves from the  
oppression and injustice of those huge  
corporations, which in their eagerness to  
amass wealth, too often ignore the rights  
of those they employ, and would reduce  
them to a condition little removed from  
slavery.

And then the ever increasing tide of  
emigration from Great Britain and Ire-  
land to the various colonies and depend-  
encies of our Empire, has brought about  
the formation of national brotherhoods.  
Blood is thicker than water, and the  
hearts of those in exile go out to others of  
their own race, or nation or province. We  
of this Province know that full well. We  
travel from one end of Canada to another  
and wherever we go, we are met by  
Islanders ready to grasp our hand in  
friendly greeting and show us every  
hospitality. Here we belong to Charlottes-  
town, or Summerside or Georgetown,  
or some smaller place. We are English,  
or Irish, or Scotch, we are Liberals or  
Conservatives, we are Roman Catholics or  
Anglicans, or Presbyterians or Methodists  
or Baptists,--we pass each other in the  
streets without any recognition; but away  
from here we are all Islanders and ready  
to stand by each other for the sake of our  
Island home.

And so with the various nationalities  
which make up the British race, in Ire-  
land where all are Irish, in Scotland  
where all are Scotch, in England where  
all are English, there is in the ordinary  
routine of life, nothing so draw out that  
patriotism and fellowship which has its  
place in the breast of every true man.  
But when distant seas are crossed and  
new homes found among strange sur-  
roundings and strange faces and perhaps  
strange languages, the love of fatherland  
finds fuel for its flame, and English or  
Irish or Scotch even to the third and  
fourth generation are drawn together,  
united so far as an unswerving loyalty  
and devotion to the Empire is concerned,  
but forgetting too, within that greater  
union, more personal bonds of affection  
with those who claim the same nation-  
ality as themselves.

And thus the Irish have their fraternal  
societies, the Scotch theirs, the English  
theirs, that they may better preserve and  
keep intact the love of that land they are  
proud to claim as their common herit-  
age.

It is sometimes cast up to us a reproach  
that we English think less of our mother  
country, less of our fellow countrymen  
than do the others, because we have been  
behind in uniting together fraternally.  
While the Scotch and the Irish have had  
their fraternal societies in Canada for  
many years, the Sons of England is a  
much younger institution. True that in  
the larger cities of the Dominion there  
has been St. George's Society, but this did  
not attempt to cover the same ground  
or accomplish the same ends as that  
which you belong.

To my mind the reproach is undeserved.  
With our inaction is not a matter of  
deliberation but a matter of temper-  
ament. We are not so emotional  
as our Celtic brothers. We take things  
more quietly than most other nations.  
For this reason we can enjoy our national


holidays lavishly without deprecating our-  
selves and our horses and everything else  
with little flag, and exploding fire crack-  
ers and blowing tin horns, as our neigh-  
bors across the border do. You, I say,  
march to church for your anniversary  
service and back again to your lounge room  
but do not make a tour of the town as the  
Irish do on St. Patrick's Day, or as the  
French in the Province of Quebec on St.  
John the Baptist. I am not criticiz-  
ing the action of these others.  
I only point out that we are not  
so demonstrative as they are, nor  
the same characteristics displayed in  
any of our wars. If a Scotch, or Irish,  
a Canadian or Australian regiment (which  
may be largely composed of Englishmen),  
performs any striking deed of valor, it  
is immediately lionized far and wide and  
the glory claimed for the nation or colony  
to which it belongs. If an English regi-
