For four days and nights he worked faithfully, taking advantage of the spring tides, which gave six feet of water at the vessel's bow at high water. The Mayflower was resting on hard clay bottom, but the tug dragged her 240 yards into deep water, and she is now lying at the Brush wharf in an undamaged condition, ready to sail the sea again. The captain is to be commended on his success.

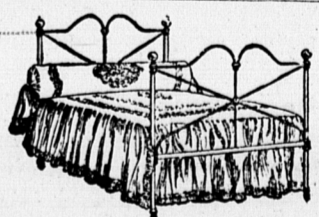
