MARKET REVIEW

There was little feature in the trading on the Canadian stock markets. Good undertone was maintained, though price changes lacked significance. The market is passing through a period of indecision, but it is apparent that it is easier to sell stocks than to buy in appreciable quantities. This indicates that the technical position is sound. Market observers show a wide variance as to the outlook for the immediate future, but the majority are agreed that there is little danger of a sharp decline from current levels.

MONTREAL POWER

We wish to draw attention to the opportunity afforded by the existing rights to acquire Montreal Power shares on what is equivalent to a partial payment plan. The rights are selling out of line in comparison with the actual stock, both old and new. At \$1 per right, a purchaser of 10 rights acquires a share of stock at a price of \$0, payable \$10 immediately, \$12.50 on July 2nd, \$12.50 November 1st, \$12.50 February 1st, 1931, and \$12.03 May 1st, 1931. Trading in the right will continue until the end of June and they will expire at the close of business July 2nd. The new stock yesterday firmed 1/2 to 62 1/2, while the rights recovered 10 cents to \$1.05.

CRUDE PETROLEUM—A sharp decline occurred in Canada's imports of crude petroleum in the month of April, the total of 47,142,823 gallons being down from nearly 66,000,000 gallons in March. The shrinkage is probably due to the fact that Canadian refiners and other users took advantage in the latter half of last year of the attractive crude market situation that then prevailed and socked up heavily. The result was that during 5 of the last 7 months in 1923 the imports varied from 113,000,000 to as high as 116,000,000 gallons per month, while for the entire year they averaged better than 90,000,000 gallons monthly. Statistics in connection with crude oil imports do not reveal a distinct seasonal trend as to volume although usually the latter months of the year provide the largest volume of shipments into the country.
