KING'S COUNTY AND PROHIBITION.

On Thursday next the electors of Kings County will vote to abrogate the Scott Act in order that the Provincial Prohibitory Law may come in automatically to take its place. It is "ringing out the old to ring in the new." The voting is upon the Scott Act and strictly under the provisions of that Act. That is why the temperance and prohibition voters will vote "against the Act"—against the Scott Act. It is not that they love the prohibition more, but that they love the old-fashioned scythe that he may operate a mowing machine in its stead—that a newer and better instrument may take the place of the old.

The Guardian is most desirous that the work which the King's County electors have before them shall be well and effectively done. From its foundation as a weekly journal in 1887 and as a daily in 1891 the watchword of The Guardian has been prohibition of the liquor traffic. To this end it has labored in season and out of season, to educate public sentiment, to influence the Legislature, to hold as far as might be the ground which the Scott Act had gained, to fight the battles against its repeal when it was attacked by its enemies, to bring it in again when defeated as it was in Charlottetown, to maintain a sound public opinion against all license laws, regulation acts and against license disguised under the plausible name of a tax act.

So from year to year the battle has gone on, now in a provincial plebiscite and again in a federal plebiscite on prohibition; Scott Act contests in 1887, 1891 and 1897 in Charlottetown, in Prince in 1884; the fierce battle for a Prohibitory Law in this city in the closing years of the last century, ending in its passage by the Legislature in 1900 and the fiercer fight for its enforcement in 1901 and 1902 and since, perpetual agitation for amendments to strengthen the law and secure better officials and machinery for its operation, and to prevent the abuse of the pardoning power; finally the effort to bring the entire Province under prohibition, the splendid triumph of this movement in Prince and the preparatory work in Kings which makes all ready for the vote of Thursday next.

All honor to the noble band of Prohibitionists in Prince Edward Island, who with steadfast conviction, with unwearied patience, with constant and self-denying effort, in season and out of season, in the division and lodge rooms, in the churches and at the polls have through all these years sought to make this a sober Province and keep it so, and to crystallize their convictions into one law which shall throughout the Island delegalise and suppress the liquor trade. It has been a pleasure to work with them for this great purpose; it is a pleasure to recount the milestones in this splendid march of moral progress; it will be a supreme pleasure to record in the near future the ultimate triumph, the goal attained, the victory won.

Prohibition had not always so many friends as it has today in town and country. The heights thus gained and kept were not attained by sudden flight, but by toiling upward in the day and in the night, when many were busy with other things, when many slept. Sometimes the tide of victory turned against us, but the temperance forces, wisely

guided, resolute and undaunted, have learned in the long struggle how to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat. The Guardian is pleased to have been in this battle from its beginning and throughout the arduous struggle, and now to share in the triumph. Wherefore we invite the electors of Kings to do their duty manfully on Thursday next, to rally to the polls with earnest purpose, and once more by their votes help to bury the liquor traffic beyond hope of resurrection.

In so doing they will be helping to complete a noble structure, whose foundations have been laid broad and deep, whose erection has been the arduous and faithful effort of many years, and on which the final vote of Queens County will ere long place the capstone with shouting. Surely there is inspiration in such a work. Tears of the widowed and orphaned victims of the whiskey traffic, prayers of many a mother and sister of a wayward son, heartfelt and earnest effort of many of the noblest in the land, have contributed to this great work, and the benediction of Heaven has rested upon it. Wherefore let every man who has a vote in King's County be found at his post on Thursday next.

It is almost incredible that in our peaceful and orderly Province persons can be found so reckless or malicious as to place obstructions upon the railway track, as is reported to have been the case on the Murray Harbor Railway. The law rightly provides severe penalties for such offences because they greatly endanger both life and property. The poor excuse of thoughtlessness cannot be pleaded in behalf of these persons. The malignant intention is only too apparent and the public safety demands the infliction of severe penalties.

The Klondyke country has received a concession for its first railway. It will be some day a part of the great intercontinental railway to be built through Siberia, Kamtschatka, under Bering Strait and through Alaska to the Yukon to connect with the Canadian system. The projectors claim that with this great line completed a passenger may leave London and pursue his journey eastward reaching New York or Halifax in twelve days, and completing the trip around the world in eighteen days.

The Pope in a recent interview accorded to Fraulein Theimer of Vienna takes a liberal view as to women entering the learned professions. He would have them become lawyers and doctors, particularly the latter if they will. But he would reserve the higher walks of theology and state craft to men. In that regard His Holiness seems to be in pretty close accord with Saint Paul. And it would seem that a majority of women are of the same way of thinking. In Canada women might long ago have had the voting franchise had they expressed any general desire for it. That they have not so expressed themselves may be taken as fairly indicating their convictions on the subject.
