A Reactionary Storm Period

prevails from February 6th to 9th. The influence of New Moon on the 5th, will tend to prolong low barometer and higher temperature from the preceding days, bringing renewal of rain and snow on and next to the 7th, 8th and ninth. Electrical storms, especially in southern sections, will be natural on and touch the 9th. On the 9th the Moon passes over the celestial equator—a fact calling for lightning and thunder, even in the winter. A seismic period prevails from the 2nd to the 8th, being central on the 5th. Watch for earthquake reports during this period.

A Regular Storm Period

blending with the Mercury, Earth, Mars and Jupiter periods, is central on the 13th, extending from the 11th to the 15th. With general low barometer at this time, tropical and violent storms may be feared in southern states. Prolonged Mercurial rains will prevail in central to northern states, turning to heavy sleet, and this, in turn, to fierce snow and blizzards, as the storms pass eastward over the country. Note indications at the oncoming of the period, according to the sections of the country in which you live, and be ready for whatever nature has in store for you. If you are caught napping, blame no one but yourself—eh? Very high barometer and fierce cold will be the sequel of this period.

A Reactionary Storm Period

will enter on and touching the 18th, 19th and 20th. Heavy sleet and snow storms will be renewed during this period, causing prolonged, wintry storms and weather. These storms will reach their culmination on and about the 20th the Moon being full and in perigee on that day. West India hurricanes are probable at this period, on the gulf and in southern coast regions. Watch barometer conditions, and incipient storm developments at this time. Great blizzards and high, cold winds from the northwest will mark the closing stages of these storms. Think and plan beforehand and be master of the situation, while others are confused and overwhelmed. A very marked seismic period will be central on the 20th, calling for earthquake reports from many extreme parts of the Earth, from the 17th to the 23rd. Watch and see.

A Regular Storm Period

runs from the 22nd to the 27th, being at its center on the 24th. The same astronomical causes are still in force at this time as during the two preceding periods, calling for the same watchfulness and precaution. Equinoctial gales and cyclones will move northward from the equator, possibly blizzards may be expected out of the northwest at the same time. Unseasonable cold will prevail far into the south during the last days of February. We desire to repeat the warning we have often given, that the growing strength of Earth's Vernal Equinox is felt all through the last half of February, so that tropical storms and hurricanes are not only possible, but probable in regions bordering on the gulf and South Atlantic states. It is always the part of prudence and common sense to be on the watch for such developments at this season. Tornadoes in the southern states are often the off-shoots of these West India cyclones in February. At the same time, some of our worst cold waves, and distressful
