TECHNICAL SCHOOL

TWO HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIVE STUDENTS ATTENDING THE TECHNICAL SCHOOL THIS SESSION.

The total attendance in day and night classes at the Technical School is two hundred and twenty five. The distribution by classes is as follows: Day classes in agriculture, motor mechanics and house economics, 34. Night classes: English, 11; arithmetic, 11; show card writing, 20; motor mechanics, 28; radio, 14; woodworking, 20; cookery, 23; home nursing, 15; millinery, 11; sewing, 38.

The night classes in cookery, sewing, home nursing, motor mechanics, and woodworking are filled. New classes will be started about the second week in January. Day classes in home economics are of three weeks duration. The next class being about January 10. Students in the day classes in agriculture and motor mechanics may join the classes at any time but early registration is advisable.

The course in home economics for girls is a new departure this year and the very large registration in these classes is ample evidence of the interest taken in this department of the school's activities. The equipment of the home-hold science kitchen is modern and adequate in every respect.
