MINISTERIAL IRREVERENCE.

The Montreal Witness apologises for the appearance in its report of some "profane" stories told at a meeting of Canadians at the recent Christian Endeavor Convention. It is needless to say that the stories only appeared in the Witness from a lack of oversight, for we know of no newspaper that is more consistently reverent, or more free from objection on the ground of profanity, than our Montreal contemporary. The minister who told the objectionable stories is not named in connection with the rebuke, but a reference to the Convention report makes it clear that the offender was once well-known in this city and one to whom a call was not very long ago extended by one of our churches.

The Witness deprecates the prevalent jesting over sacred things as a profanity, "worse in its effects than the ordinary vulgar swearing of the streets," yet heard over and over again among the very leaders of religion. We quote:

"We can imagine nothing more calculated to remove the good effects of a gathering for mutual pledges to a consecrated life than turning the holiest thoughts to ridicule, as was done in our report. Take only one of these stories as an example, that which represents a young woman as going out to pray under a tree for a husband, and who, on hearing an owl shout 'Hoo-hoo,' said any one would do. We pass over the vulgarizing effect of the situation here depicted on the mutual respect, and even reverence, which normally exist between the sexes, a subject on which more needs to be said, for, next to the matter we have in hand, there is no holy sentiment more constantly insulted by injurious jesting than this. This woman is represented as addressing her prayer presumably to God and to mistake the cry of the owl for the answer of the Almighty. The essence of humor lies in incongruity. Here is incongruity with a vengeance, but see at what infinite expense to every sentiment of reverence the humor is bought. Religion is reverence or it is nothing."

Undoubtedly it is derogatory to the dignity and usefulness of the sacred office when the minister descends to be a repeater of stale jokes, witticisms and funny stories for the amusement of a crowd of light-headed listeners, yet how frequently this occurs at the modern church social or tea meeting! On such occasion one may be reminded of an incident in the life of Alexander the Great. There was brought before him a man wonderfully expert in shooting peas through a small hole in a target. The performer expected to receive a reward from the King, but Alexander simply ordered for him a basket of peas, "that he might never want for ammunition."

Such are the rewards of the modern pea-shooter, be he minister or layman. He is rewarded in kind. His brain and memory soon become stored with petty witticisms to the exclusion of great and noble thoughts and he comes presently to be principally known as a frivolous and volatile person of little account in the more serious concerns of life. Unfortunately the tendency of the age is toward flippancy and irreverence, and it is high time that a warning note was sounded.

Australian gold mines are turning out more of the precious metal this year than last. The gold product of the year ended with June last exceeded \$57,000,000. And Canada hopes within a few years to surpass Australia. It is a great Empire we belong to.

A Chicago paper publishes an interview with a celebrated entomologist in regard to house flies. He tells that every female fly lays about 120 eggs during its existence, and of these 90 per cent are hatched out, so that a single fly becomes the progenitor of millions during the season. He adds that a careful screening of windows and doors, with the supplementary use of sticky fly paper are the best remedies and preventives that he knows of.

Aguinaldo recently issued a proclamation to the Filipinos on the anniversary of their declaration of independence. There is no note of submission in the proclamation. On the contrary it breathes a spirit of determination and of confidence as well. He tells his followers they must fight on and they will succeed. He artfully informs them that the American people are convinced of the justice of the Filipino cause; that some of the American States have risen in their favor that the great Democratic party is opposed to the war; that President McKinley is being censured for his inhumanity, and that "the doctrine of the Great Monroe that America is for the Americans has for its just parallel their affirmation that the Philippines are for the Filipinos."
