Market Reflects Conservative Win

MONTREAL, July 30.—Stocks which investors hope will be favorably affected by any change in the Dominion tariff with the formation of a Conservative Government made a quiet but steady advance today on the Montreal Stock Exchange.

UP TO \$5

Such issues as Dominion Textile, Penmans, National Steel Car, Dominion Steel and Coal "B", Dominion Bridge, Steel of Canada, General Steel Wares and the implement issues scoring advances which reached \$5 in the case of Dominion Textile.

An indication of the amount of the drop in Textile shares was given today when Canadian Cottons sold at \$60 in its first board lot sale since September 4, 1929. Today's price compared with \$91 on that date. Since that time the company has passed its dividend.

Trading on the Exchange was heavier than has been the rule during the past two months although still very low compared with last year's averages. Turnover amounted to 21,632 shares.

PREMIER LEA LABORS HARD OVER ALIBI

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I. July 30.—Commenting on election results in Prince Edward Island, Hon. Walter M. Lea, Premier of the Province, said yesterday: "The result of the election yesterday was largely attributed to the delay in nominating Liberal candidates in Queen's and the early organization and personal canvass of their opponents. The result in King's, always a close constituency, was not so surprising. Hon. A. E. McLean maintained his large majority in Prince. The total popular vote for the province gave the Liberals a small majority."

Scores Faulty Parole Board

(Special to the Guardian)
HAMILTON, Ont., July 30.—Silly, sentimental slobbering over criminals will produce in Canada a condition similar to that now existing in the United States, Chief Constable Lawler of Lindsay, warned the delegates to the Chief Constables Association of Canada here today.

In the course of a scathing denunciation of the Ontario Parole Board and its system, Chief Lawler declared that two recent murders directly were traceable to the faulty methods of parole. Pardoned criminals with long records were released to prey on the lives and properties of the citizens. In addition Chief Lawler declared the Parole Board at Toronto had been known to advise paroled criminals not to report to police stations with the result that peace officers did not know a dangerous criminal was unleashed on the district until some major crime was committed and the perpetrator again brought into the tolls. Nothing, he added, could be a greater breeder of contempt for the law.

RESIGNS FROM HARBOR COMMISSION

OTTAWA, Ont., July 30.—The resignation of Peter Jack, chairman of the Halifax Harbor Commission has been received and accepted by the Minister of Marine, it was announced here today. Mr. Jack, who ran as Liberal candidate in Halifax County, tendered his resignation on July 14, to be effective July 19th.

In the general election on Monday he was unsuccessful at the polls. The other members of the Halifax Harbor Commission are C. W. Ackhurst and John Murphy.

Late Mr. Bonnell

The death occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday at 1 p. m. of Abraham Bonnell after an illness of about two months, from the effects of an operation from which he never fully recovered.

The late Mr. Bonnell held the responsible position of Supervisor of Falconwood Hospital and Infirmary, being connected with Falconwood for the past forty six years.

Besides a sorrowing widow, he leaves three sons, Rev. Sydney, Winnipeg, Duncan, Sydney, C. B., and Daniel, Boston, and one daughter, Miss Jessie, a trained nurse residing in Boston, all of whom were present when he passed away.

By the death of Mr. Bonnell both institutions lose a faithful and conscientious official, one who was not only respected but greatly loved by the inmates of both Hospital and Infirmary.

SUMMERSIDE OPENING OF ANNUAL SHOOT CITY LEAGUE PLAY-OFFS

SUMMERSIDE, July 30.—The Summerside annual shoot got away to a good start on Wednesday morning under ideal weather conditions. About thirty-eight men from all parts of the Island participated in the shoot. This was the largest attendance there has been for some years at Summerside Rifle Range. Some excellent scores were made in each match and competition was very keen.

Leigh and MacKinnon Match

The Leigh and MacKinnon match opened the shoot at 9.30. Ten shots were fired by each man at two hundred yards. The highest scores made were, E. Coles with 47 points out of possible 50; W. A. Smith, 46; F. S. Kennedy, 46. Very close competition was evinced in this match, there being only two points difference in the positions of the second and eighth positions.

Linkletter Match

The Linkletter match was next at 300 yards and won by J. Coles with a score of 47 out of 50. A. J. McCabe was second and L. R. Allen, third, with Dr. A. W. Leard, fourth. The Summerside Rifle Association was shot at 500 yards, 10 shots to each man. The highest scores being made by R. Coles, 49; J. Coles, 49; 2nd; A. J. McCabe, 48. This was a closely contested match.

The Old Men's Match proved to be very interesting, both from the participants' point of view and also that of the spectators. The men competing in this match were from 70 to 83 years of age and were excellent shots. This match was won by Mr. L. R. Allen, with 32 points out of 35, while Dr. Leard was second with a score of 30 points; Col. Leigh third with 29 points.

During the afternoon a halt was called for the presentation of the Lawson Medal, which was presented by Mayor Lidstone to Mr. Percy Hooper of Southport. This medal was given by Mr. J. J. Lawson of Montreal, for the highest score in the Lawson Match, which was held here last year. The medal was in memory of Mr. Lawson's brother, who was for years prominently connected with the rifle clubs of this Province. It is worthy of note that among those present at the match was Mr. E. G. Love of Charlottetown, who was present at the opening of the Summerside range twenty-five years ago. He is still an excellent shot.

The visitors thanked the members of the Summerside Rifle Association for the excellent arrangements made for the day's shoot which were carried out very well.
