German Engineer Has Bathysphere With Television

By GUY BETTANY CUXHAVEN, Germany, Jan. 14.—(Reuters) — A discovery which may overshadow Professor Piccard's bathysphere (diving bell) has been announced by the German scientist Hans Udo von Schulz, who claims to have constructed a diving bell which can explore the sea without exposing any human being to danger.

The inventor, a television engineer, intends to build a television apparatus, the result of years of work, into a diving bell which will be strong enough to resist immense water pressure and to descend 15,000 feet under the surface of the sea.

If this experiment in "bathysphere" is successful, it will be possible to carry out deep-sea underwater exploration at a depth never before thought possible.

All observation, surveys and other work will be carried out by technical means and operated at long range on board the accompanying ship. Von Schulz proposes to display his underwater television apparatus at an exhibition in New York in April.

\$500,000 Fire In Fraser Valley Town

KILGARD, B. C., Jan. 14.—(CP)—The main livelihood of this tiny Fraser Valley centre last night was erased by fire which raged through the Clayburn Brick and Tile Company.

The main four-storey structure and adjacent clay shed were demolished. Fire Department officials estimated damage at \$500,000.

Kilgard, 30 miles east of Vancouver, is built around the plant which employed 150 men and supplied British Columbia, Alberta, Washington and Oregon states with building materials.

Machine shops, garages, zincs and sheds were saved by three and a half hour fighting by the company's own brigades and the Abbotsford, B.C., and Sumas, Wash., fire detachments.
