Expect 90 Million To Vote In Soviet Election Feb. 10

By ERIC DOWNTON MOSCOW, Jan. 28 — (Reuters)—Airmen flying election literature to remote and scattered communities in the Soviet Union and horsemen crossing rugged terrain inaccessible to more modern transport are helping to ensure that more than 90,000,000 persons cast their votes in the Soviet elections scheduled for Feb. 10.

Millions of voters in millions of samples in scores of languages have rolled off printing presses from the Baltic to the Pacific, telling the electors how to choose candidates for the two chambers of the Supreme Soviet—the Soviet of the Union and the Soviet of Nationalities.

Crack Alpinists are at work in mountainous areas to help voters to hills and carry election literature.

This is how the Soviet electoral system works: Every electoral area with a population of 300,000 can send one deputy to the Soviet of the Union. Irrespective of population figures, every Union republic can send 25 deputies to the Soviet of Nationalities, every autonomous region five, and every national area one.

An electoral circuit is organized for each area returning a candidate. For example, Moscow has 16 such circuits, 15 for deputies to the Soviet of the Union and one for the Soviet of Nationalities.

Rolling figures are expected to surpass those of the last elections, in December, 1937, when 90,319,346 persons or 90.3 per cent of eligible voters went to the polls. Deputies returned in the 1937 election numbered 148. This year there will be more because of voting in recently acquired territories in East Europe and the Baltic.

Although under the Soviet Socialist system there are no opposition parties, many non-party deputies were nominated—and elected—in 1937 by universal suffrage for all persons over 18 years of age, irrespective of race, nationality, sex, religion, education and residential qualifications, social origin, property status or past activities. Candidates must be at least 23 years of age.

C. F. R. EARNINGS MONTREAL, Jan. 28 — (CP)—Canadian Pacific Railway Company today reported net earnings for 1945 amounted to \$36,054,335 compared with \$43,150,684 for 1944, a decrease of \$7,100,349 and the lowest annual net since 1940.

Gross earnings were down \$2,761,676 at \$31,109,968 and working expenses rose \$4,343,654 at \$28,456,094.

Want All Seamen Enrolled In Manning Pools

MONTREAL, Jan. 27 — (CP)—Resolution requesting Canada's Transport Minister to immediately instruct manning pools to permit enrollment of all bona fide seamen, "at least until such time as measures have been taken to provide seamen with some security and occupational benefits as were given to the members of the armed forces," has been forwarded to Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Transport Minister Chevrier, the Montreal office of the Canadian Seamen's Union announced today.

The resolution, adopted at a membership meeting of the C.S.U. here Jan. 26, said the manning pools have, since Jan. 1, refused enrollment to the pools of competent seamen of many years experience and "have set up a very limited quota system which has been restricted to seamen who were formerly under the two-year contract with the pools."

It described this as "a discriminatory practice which is depriving seamen the right to continue their calling and said there was no unemployment insurance or other security benefits offered to seamen, resulting in great hardship

A MESSAGE FROM Tom Rogers

I intend nominating as a candidate for Mayor in the forthcoming Civic Election. It is also my intention to contest this election without support from any association, or organized group, in order that I, if elected, will be under obligation to none but the Citizens of Charlottetown, and consequently free to give the interests of the City as a whole my first, and only, consideration.

I intend, if elected: PLATFORM

- (1) FINANCES: (a) To investigate, with expert assistance, every possibility of securing additional revenue without increasing the present rate of taxes levied upon real estate and personal property. (b) To personally scrutinize carefully all proposed expenditures, current and capital to insure the most rigid economy compatible with the maintenance of the public services to which our citizens are entitled. (c) To act at once under the authority granted by the Provincial Legislature in 1945 to have the City's entire assessment rolls revised by a capable and independent board of assessors.
- (2) HOUSING: To immediately open negotiations with the Provincial and Dominion Governments to enable Charlottetown to participate in the benefits of any Housing Program now in existence, or which may be inaugurated in the future.
- (3) EDUCATION: To initiate a conference between the City Council, the City School Board, and the Provincial Government to consider the construction and operation of a High School in Charlottetown.
- (4) NEW INDUSTRIES: To appoint a Special Committee of the City Council to make a survey of the City to locate, and list possible sites for factories, warehouses, etc., and then by every available method including advertising and correspondence endeavour to encourage local and inland interests to establish employment-giving industries in Charlottetown.
- (5) POLICE: To effect re-organization of the Police Department with a view to increasing efficiency, particularly in the enforcement of the traffic by-laws and the suppression of Juvenile Delinquency.
- (6) PUBLIC PROPERTY: (a) To maintain all Civic property in good repair. (b) To repair and maintain all the present streets, and to open new streets in areas where new building has made them necessary. (c) To restore our squares to their former beauty. (d) To do all the above mentioned with the most careful regard to economy in the expenditure of Civic funds.
- (7) TOURIST INDUSTRY: To encourage by every available means the Tourist Industry. I fully realize the increasing importance of this industry in our civic and provincial economy, and its potentialities. I will seek advice from the Travel Bureau, and parties with specialized knowledge as to how the Civic Government can make Charlottetown more attractive to visitors from other parts of Canada, and the United States.
- (8) WATER FRONT and BRIGHTON BRIDGES: To urge continuously upon the Governments of Canada, and of Prince Edward Island the necessity of the undertaking, and immediate commencement of these projects. In these matters I will whole-heartedly co-operate with the members of Parliament, the Provincial Government, the Board of Trade, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and any other organization or individual interested. Any of whom may have the credit for any success achieved.

If this "PLATFORM" meets with your approval, I solicit your support and earnestly assure you that, if I am elected, every "plank" will be implemented.
