LOSS OF LIFE NOT SO LARGE

As First Reported at Crow's Nest Land Slide

THE DISASTER AT FRANK. OTTAWA, May 1.—(Special)—Advises from Frank today place the dead at 34 men, three women and 20 children, and 11 injured, only two or three seriously. Six cottages were completely destroyed. The loss of life was less than first reported.

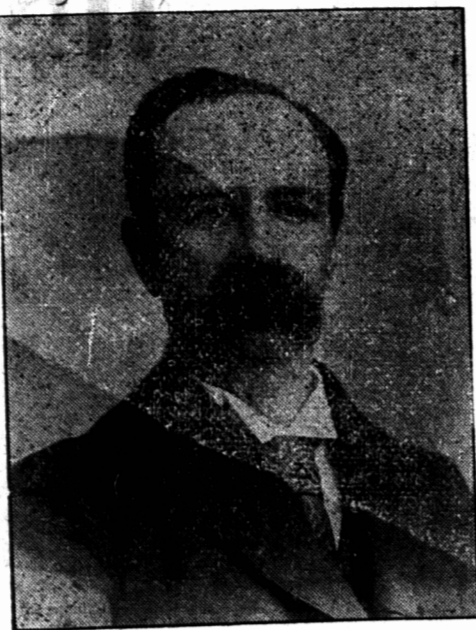
SUDDEN DEATH OF EX-SENATOR. HALIFAX, May 1.—(Special)—Ex-Senator Carmichael of New Glasgow died suddenly today. He was out yesterday and was well as usual this morning.

SKETCH OF HIS CAREER. [Lieut. Col. Hon. James William Carmichael was of Scottish descent, and was born at New Glasgow, Dec. 16, 1819. He was educated at Pictou Academy. Married in 1861 Maria McColl, who died December 1874. A shipowner, represented Pictou in the House of Commons from 1867 to 1872 when he was defeated; re-elected in 1874 and sat till 1878. Called to the Senate Dec. 31, 1898. Recently resigned. A Liberal and a Presbyterian.]

PARIS AWAITS KING EDWARD

Who Wires Thanks From the French Frontier

President Loubet Returns from Algiers to Welcome Him—Gates of a Monastery are Battered Down.

PARIS AWAITS KING EDWARD. PARIS, May 1.—(Special)—The French Capital is in holiday attire awaiting the arrival of King Edward. The weather is gloomy. The royal train arrived at Dijon at 10 o'clock. There the King was officially welcomed and the train proceeded to Paris.

KING EDWARD TO KING VICTOR. On arriving at the French frontier King Edward telegraphed King Victor Emmanuel again, bidding him farewell and renewing his thanks for the splendid reception in Italy.

PRESIDENT LOUBET'S RETURN. President Loubet reached Paris from Marseille this morning and proceeded to the Elysee Palace.

MONASTERY GATES BATTERED DOWN. MARSEILLES, May 1.—(Special)—The barricaded monastery of the Capuchins was taken before daylight by a large force of police who battered down the gates and arrested the friars and their sympathizers within the building.

STATE OF SIEGE IS PROCLAIMED

In Salonica Because of Big Dynamite Outrages

Turkish Bank Blown up—Precautions Taken Throughout Turkey—Snowstorm Amid Blossoms in New York.

DYNAMITE OUTRAGES IN SALONICA. CONSTANTINOPLE, May 1.—(Special)—A state of siege has been proclaimed in Salonica where the Ottoman Bank was destroyed by dynamite and the Turkish post office and other buildings were attacked by bands of men armed with bombs.

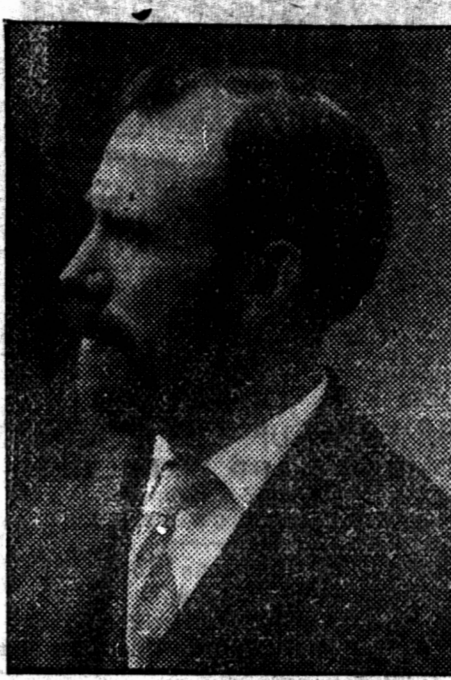
