At the close of the business part of the conference, Rev. G. Steel addressed the meeting on The Twentieth Century Evangelistic movement. After which address the members of the District spoke on the subject under consideration. The following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Having listened with great pleasure and profit to the thoughtful and heart-searching address of our President, and having heard the expression of the desires and purposes of the brethren, therefore resolved that we as a District, fall in line with the recommendations of the conference re the evangelistic movement, and will endeavour to make this conference year a glorious one in the salvation of souls. The conference recommendations referred to are as follows:—

1.—That this evangelistic campaign be regarded as of first importance in the business of the year, and that, properly understood in all its bearings and relationships, it have the right of many.

2.—That evangelistic conventions or services be held in connection with the financial district meetings, and that on their occasions the question of revival effort on each and every circuit be considered, and such arrangements made for help and co-operations as may be necessary to success.

That whatever practicable, trustees local preachers, exhorters, class leaders, stewards, society representatives, and other official members, associated with choir leaders and presidents and superintendents of church societies be gathered in some form of meeting, where they may pray and place together, and so stimulate one another to zeal and effort—in this great movement.

That Sabbath, Oct. 14, 1900, be specially set apart for this work, and known as the Twentieth Century Revival Sabbath, revival sermons to be preached on platform meetings held in all our congregations, pastor and people uniting in earnest prayer and faithful efforts on behalf of the unsaved. That wherever possible this inauguration day be immediately followed by revival services.

There was a well attended public meeting held in the evening presided over by the Chairman of the District, when the following program was rendered: Hymn by Choir; Prayer by Rev. J. Dystant; Hymn by Choir; Address by President of Conference, on the Outlook of the Twentieth Century; Hymn by Choir; Address by Rev. W. J. Howard, on the Necessity of the Holy Ghost; Address by Rev. W. A. Thomson on Necessity of Prayer; Address by Rev. F. Wightman, on Co-operation; Address by Rev. A. E. Chapman, on The Promises; Address by Rev. G. F. Dawson, Every Soul for Christ; a few remarks by the Pastor, Rev. N. McLaughlin; Hymn by Choir; Prayer and Benediction by Rev. E. Slackford.

A Handsome English Railway Station.

The American Consul, at Nottingham, Mr. McFarlane, writing to his Government the other day, says:

"A new railway station, one of the largest and finest in England, was opened for traffic in the city yesterday. It was built by two roads—the new Great Central and the Great Northern—and is in the heart of the city, being entered from each direction by tunnels. It covers twelve acres, and cost slightly in excess of £1,000,000 (\$4,868,500). Five hundred and eighty thousand cubic yards of material were removed from the site, and the platform frontage, of solid masonry, built to car-floor height, aggregates two miles. The largest station in Britain is the Waverley, at Edinburgh, covering 23 acres. Liverpool street station, London, covers 22½ acres. Next to the new Nottingham Central, now the largest in the provinces, comes New street, Birmingham, covering 10½ acres. All of these stations are of the most substantial pattern, being constructed entirely of stone, brick, and iron."
