District Governor Visits S'ide Kinsmen Club

At the regular meeting of the Summerside Kinsmen Club held last evening at Coyle's Restaurant, the local club was host to district governor Victor Coffin of Sydney, N. S. After a delicious banquet the routine business of the club was disposed of and the president J. Elmer Murphy called upon His Worship Mayor Arnett to extend a welcome to the visiting governor. Mayor Arnett expressed his pleasure at being present and took the opportunity of congratulating the members of the Kinsmen Club for the splendid programme of work they have carried out during the past three years, their youth, welfare, open air rink, hockey club etc. Mayor Arnett reminded the members that a service club such as this can and does play a big part in solving the problems of a troubled world. In introducing the distinguished guest the president, J. E. Murphy gave a brief outline of the splendid record of achievement to his credit since taking office. District governor Coffin chose for his subject "Kinsmanship" and outlined the history of the organization since its foundation twenty-eight years ago, its struggle for existence during the first ten years, then during the first years of the war when the club suddenly became a big organization with many and great responsibilities extending throughout the Dominion until it numbered 206 clubs and eight thousand members. Victoria Rink On Saturday night the Victoria Rink closed for the season with an exciting hockey match between Tryon Arrows and Canoe Cove Rangers, who were the winners. This rink, formerly owned by the Inman sisters of Grapaud and Charlottetown, has been bought by D. G. MacLeod and H. B. Wood and during the summer months will be completely overhauled. With new promenades, a canteen, dressing rooms, and provision made for curling inside, and a steel roof, it should remain the popular recreation centre it has occupied since its erection. Several contractors have been interviewed and negotiations are underway for its reconstruction so that, when next Fall approaches, it will have a definite "New Look". The management of Victoria Rink wish to thank all its patrons during the season just closed, the South Queens Hockey League and its executive, including the official referee, Don MacLeod, B. C. Wood for the silver trophy, Col. W. W. Reid, and all who helped in any way to carry out their physical fitness program.

Anglican Synod Meets At Halifax HALIFAX, April 27 — (CP) — Archbishop George Frederick Kingston, Primate of all Canada, addressed the 74th annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Anglican Synod in its opening session here today. He stressed the importance of all clergy instructing their parishioners in the sanctity of marriage. "If we are to preserve marriage in the modern world, we must surround it with the atmosphere of holiness," he said. The Primate emphasized four points: marriages should be in the Church; mixed marriages should be discouraged; no Anglican clergyman should marry a divorced person; and no rector should grant a divorce permission to receive holy communion without first consulting the Bishop. Financial condition of the diocese, which includes Prince Edward Island, had "greatly cheered" him and responses to the Archbishop's appeal and the Anglican Advance Appeal were widespread. Support of the missionary movement, however, needed encouragement, he said. If each member of the diocese would contribute an extra two cents per person a year, the missionary fund could be met. "It is humiliating to make this appeal for two cents a year for missions when in Nova Scotia the average citizen spends \$35 on liquor and \$21 on cigarettes," he added. The Archbishop asked elimination of "every vestige of gambling for material gain, including lotteries, raffles, games of chance and bingo for money-making purposes," in discussing ways by which parishes could raise funds. There was nothing objectionable, however, in card parties, dances or other functions as long as they were used solely for pleasure and fellowship. He forecast that Rt. Rev. R. H. Waterman, Bishop coadjutor, would "make significant contributions in every department of the Church's work in this diocese." "I insist that he go to the Lambeth conference this year in spite of his desire to continue his intensive visitations here," Archbishop Kingston said. "An conference of all Anglican bishops in the British Empire will open in Lambeth, England, in June. The Archbishop has been invited to preach at one of the sessions."

Confer On Canada's Part In European Aid WASHINGTON, April 26 — (CP) — Trade Minister C. D. Howe of Canada and Paul Hoffman, head of the European co-ordination administration, conferred tonight at the Canadian Embassy on Canada's part in this country's multi-billion dollar program to aid European recovery. Hoffman expects to have about \$5,300,000,000 to spend in the first year on aid to the United Kingdom and 15 European countries outside the Soviet zone of influence. Tentative estimates indicate that Canada will be expected to provide about \$1,600,000,000 worth of food and other commodities required by the receiving countries in the first 15 months of the program's operation beginning the first day of this month.
