

\$276,000 Placed In Estimates For The Car Ferry

Estimated Deficit This Year Represents Saving Over Last Year's Approximated Figure.

Authoritative information has been received by The Guardian from Messrs. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P., and J. H. Myers, M.P., with regard to expenses of the car ferry steamer operating between Borden and Tormentine.

Separate accounting on this service was not established until June, 1933, but the figures for the prior months of that year have been approximated, and indicate revenue during 1933 of \$122,768.40; maintenance and operation, \$405,694.26, leaving a deficit on operation of \$282,925.86. Interest charges bring this amount up to \$288,144.88.

The total capital investment as of March 31, 1933, was \$6,988,885.

For the first two months of the current year, the operating deficit has been \$67,129. Provision has been made in the estimates for an anticipated deficit this year of \$276,000. (Since receipt of the foregoing information, a communication to the same effect has been received from Mr. A. E. MacLean, M. P.)

SUMMERSIDE Free Discussion In City Council Regular Meeting

Councillor Bell Outlines Program For Year at Monthly Meeting. Tenders Accepted, Discussion Of Poultry Inspection, Appointment Of Police Officer, Among Business.

The Summerside Town Council at their regular monthly meeting held last night in the Council Chambers, Mayor Lidstone presiding passed their budget for the year with an estimated surplus of \$108,000. The revenue was estimated at \$702,000 with an estimated expenditure of \$694,000, and allowing an appropriation for sinking funds of \$168,000, which left a surplus of \$108,000 as stated above.

Councillor Bell chairman of the Finance Committee 1: submitting the budget said he was very happy to state that the committee had been able to arrange the budget to come well within the estimates, with a small surplus, without increasing the taxes. This was only possible by paying down expenditures for school purposes was not within the revenue with a small surplus. Councillor Bell pointed out that although a large number of ratepayers at a citizens meeting held last Fall had voted on an increase of taxation if necessary to continue the work on the streets by saving in other directions this had not been found necessary. He showed, however, that the amount of \$3.60 on the \$1,000 levied for school purposes was not nearly sufficient and sooner or later a larger amount would have to be levied for that purpose.

A telegram received from the Premier Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, that afternoon was read to the Council to the effect that the time had been extended for the street work and the sum appropriated for the work by the government was guaranteed. On receiving this communication a motion was passed by Councillor Bishop seconded by Councillor Carruthers that the program laid out last Fall for the paving of certain streets should stand and that the work should be continued without delay, and the Council would arrange with the Warren Paving Company for the completion of their contract.

A motion was passed by Councillor MacNeil that Mr. Jackson be rehired as chief engineer of the Electric Light plant at \$1650.00 for this year. The meeting adjourned until Monday next.

Considerable discussion of matters relating to the necessity for poultry inspection, and necessity of making changes in the building by laws featured the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held last evening.

His Worship Mayor Kennedy presided at a full council. After the adoption of the minutes of previous meetings and confirmation of bills to be paid the City Clerk read a communication from Messrs Chas. Williams and Vincent Power stating that they would be willing to give a five foot strip of their property for the widening of Admiral St. On motion of Councillor Reardon, seconded by Councillor Turner it was decided to accept the offer.

The Health Officer's and the Meat and Milk Inspector's reports were then presented, both of which appear below.

Dr. Croken's report was followed by considerable discussion of the matter of poultry inspection. The Councillor Holman commended the Patriot for bringing the matter before the public. He knew cities in the Maritimes where unclean fowls are not permitted to be sold. He believed it worth the city's while to provide a place in the market for the inspection of poultry.

In reply to a question by Councillor Holman, Dr. Croken stated that he did not recall a time when he would recall nearly the whole time on inspection particularly at such seasons as Christmas. He did not believe there was any great danger from this source.

Dr. Croken believed that a very small percentage of fowl sold in the market are diseased. He remarked that in Toronto which is held to be a model city in many respects fowl are sold unclean. He pointed out that tuberculosis in poultry is not so serious as tuberculosis in cattle as bovine tuberculosis can be transmitted to humans while the type of tuberculosis contracted by birds cannot be transmitted to humans. He agreed with Dr. Croken that it is not necessary to have inspection.

With regard to civic employment Councillor MacDougall recommended the splitting of time of the street cleaning work in order to give employment to more men.

Councillor Reardon stated that four of the street cleaners employed last year were now receiving government pensions and have consequently been laid off. Finances would not permit the hiring of any more.

Councillor Turner stated he had received requests from residents of Brighton for the laying of a sidewalk on Ambrose Street. After some discussion the matter was referred to the street committee.

Councillor MacDougall reporting for the public property committee stated that the windows of the market building had been fixed up and other small repairs made.

Councillor Reardon reported that the Tenders Committee stated that tenders for horsehoes and for supplying gas and oil had been examined and resolutions prepared.

Councillor Vandierstine of the Market Committee suggested that the fish market be kept cleaner and that it not be opened Mondays and Thursdays until the evening.

After some discussion the matter was left to the Market Committee.

The Police report given below was then read by Councillor Blanchard. Councillor Holman asked if the speed limit signs had been replaced in the park and suggested that an example be made of autolists using the park roadway as a speedway.

Councillor Holman stated that certain milk vendors whose names he could give if necessary of buying empty milk bottles from children about the streets. He denounced this practice as encouraging children to steal. He was assured by Councillor Blanchard that these matters would be taken up.

Resolutions were then passed by the meeting accepting the tenders of Large Bros. for the supplying of gas and oils and the tender of H. E. and A. Ford for horsehoes and blacksmith work.

A resolution that Fred C. Blanchard be appointed constable on the City Police force at \$80 a month to begin June 1st, was passed before the meeting. It was moved.

3. In a letter addressed to the committee (which was read earlier in the House of Commons by Premier R. B. I should not have said what I did about buying the government and commissions and I wish to retract."

Tobacco Magnate "Sorry" He Made Insinuations.

"Dear Sir:—

"I told you after my examination yesterday that I was sorry for some of the things I had said. I would have liked to have asked the Minister of Finance, the Minister of Excise, and the Montreal Minister, Mr. Cahon, if they could tell why other motives or the conduct of any member of the Government.

"You may read this letter to the committee and make it public if you choose.

"The two statements which I said would be sent to the committee are being prepared. They will be finished tomorrow when I shall enclose them.

"I am interested in the growers receiving as high prices as possible, but the draft agreement you submitted to me is not sufficiently definite to insure fair treatment to all. I have therefore hesitated to sign.
