If this were carried into effect, the shipper would be relieved of the fear of having his goods unfairly turned down in a foreign port. As it is he often has to surrender documents and grant rebates and extension which he knows are not justifiable in order to escape an entire loss or his adventure.

I think our potato growers in New Brunswick, and exporters, should be conversant with the recent enactment of the Canadian Department of Agriculture under the Destructive Insect and Pest Act, which became effective upon March 12, 1930 and for the benefit of potato growers in this Province, I take the liberty of repeating the same. I found type-written copies in the hands of some of the importers in Cuba. Importers are demanding that these regulations be strictly complied with. I therefore quote this regulation verbatim:

"By Order in Council (P. C. 557) passed on March 12, 1930, Section V of the General Regulations was rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

V. An inspector shall have the power to inspect before export to any foreign country, or shipment within the Dominion any plant, and to grant a certificate according to the requirements of any country demanding such, or for domestic purposes.

"All certificates so issued must bear a copy of the official seal of the plant disease or insect pest inspection service carried on under this Act.

"In the case of potatoes, no person shall be allowed to sell or offer, advertise, expose or hold in possession for sale, any potatoes in any manner or form described or designated as certified, inspected, registered, selected, disease-free, or otherwise indicating their suitability for seed or seed purposes, unless such potatoes have been inspected in the field and after harvest by an inspector under the Destructive Insect and Pest Act and have been found sufficiently vigorous and free from serious diseases, to warrant them from being classed into either of the two following grades: Certified seed potatoes grade extra No. 1, or certified seed potatoes grade small sized (1 1-2-3) only."

"Certified seed potatoes must be contained in sacks, barrels or other containers, to each of which shall be durably attached a certificate in the form of an authorized official tag, issued by an inspector, and bearing the grower's name or number."

The safest and best way to ship potatoes to the South American market is by wooden crates.

It is not absolutely essential that potatoes should be shipped in crates. The Cuban trade will accept potatoes in crates, bags and barrels. South American trades, however, should be in 65 pound or 180 pound crates net weight.

FOX SKINS

In Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro, there is an excellent market for our fox skins. Mr. Milligan, representing the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association, took down thirty skins with him on the "Prince Robert" which were exhibited at the British Empire Exhibition. He sold ten of them within the first two or three days, and told me that he would readily dispose of the balance. He considered that there was an excellent market for this industry, especially in Buenos Aires. He has established an agency in this City, and expects to do an excellent business for the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association. New Brunswick fox breeders should immediately step in with their line of goods.

CANNED LOBSTER

New Brunswick canned lobster is at present being sold in Buenos Aires as an English product, being purchased by C. E. Morton and Co and Cross and Blackwell, repacked in England, and reshipped and sold by these firms to the Argentine and Brazil. Here is an opportunity for our lobster packers to ship direct to these South American countries. I would suggest getting in touch with the importers and brokers recommended to me by the Bank, whose names are given in this report, and deal direct.

ALBERTON

The Rev. Dr. Clarence MacKinnon, Principal of Pine Hill College, Halifax, was the welcome week end guest of Rev. A. S. and Mrs. Weir. CERTIFICATES REQUIRED

Cuba requires "Health Certificates" to accompany all potatoes imported, stating that the potatoes are free from the disease—potato wart or canker. In addition, all potatoes shipped as seed must be accompanied by a certificate issued by a recognized agricultural authority, stating the seed to be in a good sanitary condition, and suitable for seed purposes. At present, Canada No. 1 potatoes fulfill the requirements of the Cuban decree to the letter, but apparently not to the spirit intended, as I have been given to understand that "Certified seed" was intended, but difficulties arose in the wording of the decree and the word certified could not be used. As the Cubans are particular to hold to the letter of their decree, the Canadian shippers are quite within their rights to ship any potatoes that conform to the decree as seed potatoes. The Cuban Department have the matter under consideration at the present time and it is probable a new decree will shortly be passed demanding certified seed and grown from certified seed only to be admitted free.

It is estimated weather conditions and late blight will curtail the Cuban crop about forty per cent. While Canadian seed generally gives good yields, and the growers show a decided preference for good Canadian seed, some growers state they do not always receive certified

STRESSES MARITIME OPPORTUNITIES FOR EXTENSION OF TRADE

Interesting Report Of New Brunswick Government Representative On Trade With Cuba, Trinidad And South America.

A very interesting report has been submitted to the New Brunswick Government by the Hon. Leonard P. D. Tilley, K. C., President of the Executive Council and official representative of the Province on the trade and goodwill mission to South America recently completed under the auspices of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the Dominion Government.

The following excerpts from Hon. Mr. Tilley's report are of particular interest to readers in this Province.

POTATOES

The Maritime Commissioner Stationed in Toronto in his circular letter T. E. 469 recently issued, reports: "The Imperial Oil Company, through its purchasing agent here, (Toronto) ships weekly throughout the year to South America from seventy to one hundred crates of potatoes, weighing one hundred and twenty pounds each. The crate used is known as the standard navy crate. These potatoes are subject to considerable handling and pass through a very warm climate, which accounts for the use of crates both for protection and ventilation.

"The present supply is secured from Long Island, but the purchasing agent has no knowledge of where the potatoes may be grown.

"I am in close touch with the buyer of these potatoes, and he has expressed a desire of securing them, if possible, from Maritime Canada. He is prepared to place immediately an order for one or two trial shipments, and stresses the point that only No. 1 stock will be considered. He adds further that he must be satisfied as to the reliability and dependability of any person or firm accepting orders. If the trial shipments are satisfactory, he is prepared to enter into a contract for steady shipments each week throughout the year. The above mentioned shipments of potatoes are at present being shipped in bond via New York, and are therefore not subject to the United States duty."

export trade, however, that we think it well to call attention to. In the first place, the language is foreign to us, and this interferes with the free exchange of information. In the next place, many of their customs regulations are so complicated, it is almost impossible to follow them. They appear to us to be unnecessarily complicated. For instance, Cuba required seven copies of consular invoice in Spanish, the same number of commercial invoices in the language of the country of origin, a Government certificate that the potatoes are free from disease, and a certificate on the shippers' own letterhead stating where the potatoes were grown, that they are free from disease, the price at which they were bought, etc., and a declaration on the back of each invoice to the same effect. Consular fees are determined on the amount of the invoice and the number of signatures the Consul has to make.

"Then there is the difficulty of securing good agents. Owing to the distance we are from our market, and the difficulty in grasping the finer shades of meaning in the Spanish letters, it is necessary to give our agents large discretionary powers. Sometimes we have to entrust them with large and valuable shipments, and unless they are thoroughly reliable the shipper takes heavy risks. They must be men of character as well as financially sound, and good judges of men, so that they will not recommend sales to parties who are not reliable.

Again, there is the matter of collecting bills in these foreign parts. Apparently thirty days' sight is the ordinary way of selling in many of these republics. If the goods are shipped D. O. P., and the market goes down, or the buyer has not the funds on hand, he leaves the shipment on the wharf, where it soon becomes a total loss. If the goods are shipped on thirty days' sight the customer must have five or more shipments made to him before we are aware that he is not paying his drafts. Even though the shipments may be small, this soon mounts up.

"We have a suggestion that we think if carried out would be of considerable assistance to our shippers. Let the Canadian Trade Commissioner have the authority to take over and dispose of all Canadian shipments of a perishable nature that are refused, and remit the proceeds to the shippers, if they are not promptly taken up by the consignee

Marketing Difficulties
