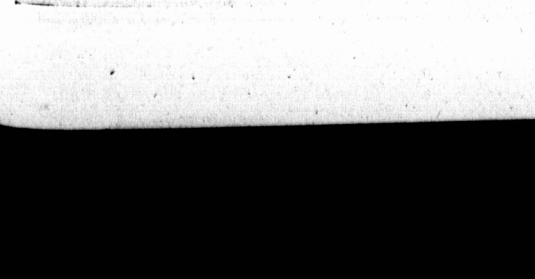

Winnipeg Gets Able Conductor From Maritimes

HALIFAX, Oct. 12 - (CP) - In the world of music, a loss for Halifax and the Maritimes is going to prove Winnipeg's gain.

Czech-born Walter Kaufmann - composer, conductor and teacher - is leaving here at the end of October to take over as conductor of the newly-formed Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.

Through illness, he had to leave in 1937, and return to England and there again, after doing distinguished work with the BBC, he left for Canada and a post as head of the piano and theory department of the Halifax Conservatory of

Music. As a composer, the dark-complexioned virtuoso received international acclaim for his "Strange Town at Night," and "Madras Express." While in England he wrote the complete music score for two J. Arthur Rank productions, "Parsifal," and "Sudan Dispute."

Mr. Kaufmann said the United States has more than 200 symphony orchestras while Canada has only four - in Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal.
