## Canucks Unbeaten March In N. H. L. Route Is Continued By 1-1 Draw

MONTREAL, Nov. 23—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens continued their unbeaten march over the National Hockey League route tonight, going to the top of the standing by playing to a 1-1 overtime draw with New York Rangers before a crowd of 9,600 fans.

It was the sixth straight game without a defeat for the Flying Frenchmen who now have won four and tied two. The point gained from the draw placed them a single point ahead of the idle Toronto Maple Leafs, only other unbeaten team in the league. The Leafs have won four and tied one.

The Habitués had to come from behind with a valiant rush to gain their draw against the Rangers. Little Polly Drouin, centreman for the Drouin-Louis Trudel-Rod Lorrain line, fired the tying goal in the 18th minute of the last period after Wilbur (Dutch) Hiller had given the Broadway Blues the lead in the 15th minute.

Drouin's tally came while the sides were at full strength but Hiller, most consistent goal-getter this season, for the Rangers, got his score while his team was minus a man through a penalty to Alf Pike for interference.

## Red Wings Reach Third Place In 3-2 Victory Over Amerks

DETROIT, Nov. 23—(CP)—With Don Deacon scoring two of their goals, Detroit Red Wings defeated New York Americans 3-2 tonight for Americans' fifth straight loss of the National Hockey League season.

The victory lifted Detroit into third place above the idle Chicago Black Hawks.

A slim crowd of 4,500 saw Deacon, rookie centre up from Indianapolis, slip in two of the Detroit scores in the opening period Deacon turned in some smart skating on a solo dash that started near centre ice. Harry Armstrong tied the score later in the period on a fine play with Lorne Carr and Harvey Jackson.

The Wings went in front to stay in the early minutes of the second period on a goal by Cecil Dillon.

Later, with the Americans short-handed as a result of a tripping penalty given Allan Murray, Deacon took a pass from Modere Bruneteau right at the goal mouth and smashed the puck in.

The Americans played furious hockey throughout the final period. Rookie Jack Tomson put them within a goal of a tie early in the period when he took the puck from Art Chapman on a faceoff and the rubber home.

## Veteran Leads Marathoners To Repeat Victory

BERWICK, Pa., Nov. 23—(AP)—Lou Gregory, veteran harrier of Manlius, N. Y., repeated his victory of eight years ago by leading a record field of 48 home in the 32nd annual running of the Berwick Marathon today.

Lloyd Longman of Toronto finished second, 100 yards back of Gregory and the same distance in front of Johnny Kelly of Boston.

Another Toronto runner, Duncan McCallum of the Monarch Athletic Club, finished fifth while in 11th place was A. B. Morton, crack marathoner of Galt, Ont.

Gregory representing the Millrose Athletic Association of New York covered the distance of nine miles and 175 yards in 47 minutes, 50 seconds, 11 seconds faster than his winning time in the 1931 race although more than a half minute over the course record.

## Eddie Shore In Line - up For Sunday

BOSTON, Nov. 23—(AP)—Boston Bruins of the National Hockey League announced tonight that Eddie Shore, their all-star defence man, would play against New York Rangers here Sunday night.

Shore, now owner of Springfield Indians of the International-American Hockey League, has agreed to play in all of the Bruin's home games after Dec. 15, and before that date if an emergency arises. Manager Art Ross said the club considered the injury to Jack Crawford, who will be out for a month, as an emergency under its agreement with Shore.
