### Charlottetonian Heads Boy Scout Drive in New York

THE LONG ISLAND DAILY PRESS OF MARCH 22 REPORTS THAT:

NEW YORK, March 28—E. S. Macdonald of Kew Gardens, vice-president of Bank of the Manhattan Company, will serve as chairman of the Queens section of the silver anniversary fund raising campaign of the Boy Scout Foundation of Greater New York. It was announced today by Mr. Charles W. Froessel, on behalf of the Foundation executive committee. Mr. Froessel is president of the Queens Council of Boy Scouts, which is a unit of the foundation.

The campaign is designed to raise \$329,700 and will be carried on early in April simultaneously in the five boroughs of New York City, as one of many activities designed to observe the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Boy Scouts of America.

Mayor LaGuardia is chairman of a city-wide group of more than 100 honorary sponsors of the Silver Anniversary observance, which already the following Queens citizens have consented to join: County Judge Thomas C. Kadien, jr. of Astoria, Henry C. Von Elm and Floyd B. Odium of Forest Hills, Ell's Parker Butler of Flushing and William J. Hamilton of Corona.

President Roosevelt has been for many years the president of the foundation, of which Barron Collier is at present the acting president, and Major Arthur W. Proctor the secretary.

Mr. Macdonald's plans include the appointment of representative citizens as campaign chairmen in each of the approximately forty communities of Queens County, and also the formation of a special committee to conduct the canvass among New York business men. Mr. Froessel stated, "We are very fortunate," he continued, "to secure the consent of an outstanding figure like Mr. Macdonald. His leadership will insure the success of the campaign in Queens.

**FRANKNESS**

There is no argument in favour of war, but some good has come out of war. During the Great War there was more evidence of willingness to give disinterested service than at any other time, service which is perhaps the outstanding need of our country today.

Before the war, there was a great deal of hypocrisy which was destroyed by the stern realities of a life and death struggle. It was until the vital importance of man power came to be understood that the public became informed as to one group of diseases which, for generations had been sapping the life blood of the nation.

The history of the world might be written around the diseases which have afflicted mankind. Early in the old testament, we read that one of the venereal diseases had made its appearance. Since that time, history records many references to the efforts made to control syphilis and gonorrhoea.

As we have said, the history of mankind and the history of disease go hand in hand. Smallpox was unknown in North America until it was introduced by the early settlers. It is estimated that fully one-half of the North American Indians perished from this disease.

Such being the case, it seems but justice, if it be true, as most observers believe, that syphilis was brought back to Europe by the earliest discoverers. True it is that it did then appear in a most severe and destructive form, as if it were a new disease attacking for the first time.

What the Great War accomplished in this direction who to allow us to view the two venereal diseases, which are major enemies, and instead of adopting an ostrichlike attitude, see them for what they are. We cannot get anywhere in fighting disease unless we know the strength and weakness of our enemies.

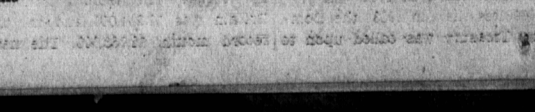
