\*PROPOSED CHANGE.—Owing to the practical failure of the lobster fishing along the North Side of the Island during the present season, and the many drawbacks encountered by the fishermen for several years past, an agitation has been begun to have the season for fishing lobsters on the North Side changed from two months beginning April 26th, when the present season opens to six weeks beginning August 1st. It is claimed that the present season opens too early as the ice generally remains on the coast long after destroying lines traps and nets while the fishermen are often along their own shores and have to purchase it at exorbitant prices in other localities. The amount of fishing gear destroyed every spring by ice storms and generally unfavorable weather conditions which usually prevail at this period is in itself no inconsiderable item, and very materially lessens the fishermen's profits. During August and September the weather is more settled, storms are less frequent and the fishermen can have a supply of bait caught and in readiness when the season opens, besides which they can very profitably employ the interval in codfishing, and as the majority of them are farmers, they would be enabled to do their cropping, which cannot be done under the present arrangement, as the busiest part of the spring's work comes during the lobster fishing season. Veteran fishermen speaking from experience claim that lobsters are more plentiful and of a much better quality during the latter part of the summer than in the early spring. As the lobster fishing ranks next to agriculture in the province, and its existence, at least along the North Side seems to be imperilled by the present regulations it is understood a strong and determined effort will be made by those interested to have this apparently necessary change brought about and thus save the industry from extinction.—E.

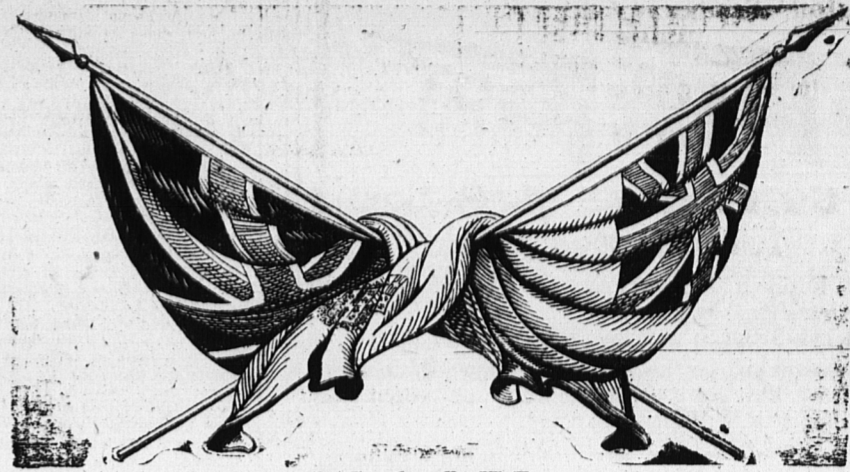
