THE RESIDENCE OF Mrs. McNEVIN, St. Eleanor's was completely destroyed by fire which broke out yesterday morning at 7 o'clock. The fire originated in the kitchen stove exploded as the 8-year-old son of Mr. McNevin was attempting to light it. The lad escaped injury.

That arrangement, Dr. Creelman said, is the result of a decision made last Monday by the medical men of the Province, some forty physicians representing all population centres from Tignish to Souris met on that day at the Charlottetown Hotel to

hear Dr. T. B. Acker, with his background of more than twenty years experience with the disease, discuss the polio situation as it affected the Province.

As a result of the medical men had been left with physical discovered from the disease but who conference, six physicians were appointed to comprise a committee which would have the responsibility of making all plans and arrangements for the further treatment of those who had recovered from the disease but who were still physically disabled.
