Sunday School Conventions

The Rev. W. A. Ross of Moncton General Secretary of the Maritime Sunday School Association arrived in the city Saturday evening. Mr. Ross will be on the island for the balance of the month of June assisting with District Sunday School Conventions and the County Convention for Prince. The Rev. James King, Ph. O., Maritime Field Secretary, Charlottetown, will arrive on Saturday next to assist with the programme of District Conventions.

Last year, the Sunday School Association was reorganized, on entirely new lines. The denominational Sunday School Boards are now co-operating officially in conducting the activities of the Association and are carrying out a great programme of Religious Education and leadership training during the current year. In this programme, the Maritime Association, and three Maritime denominational secretaries, together with Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. Workers form one team to carry out the programme. This programme includes 225 District conventions; 39 county conventions; one Maritime convention; 11 boys conferences; 8 girls conferences; 3 boys camps, 4 girls camps; two summer schools and three Christian Workers Conferences.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. R. W. CARSON

The death of Mr. Richard Carson, on the morning of May 12th, came with shocking suddenness to his family and to the people of Bonshaw and surrounding communities.

Mr. Carson had been in failing health and a great sufferer for some years, but had been about his work up to the day of his death. On the evening previous he retired as usual but during the night he was stricken with apoplexy from which he never rallied, and after about four hours of suffering he passed peacefully away.

Quite early in life Mr. Carson joined the Methodist Church at Milton near his boyhood home. For many years he took an active interest in Sunday School work and in the home always showed kind hospitality to both stranger and friend.

Funeral services at the house

were conducted by Revs. Hubley and MacKay, and at the grave by Rev. Mr. Webster of Corwall. His sorrowing widow, six daughters and four sons, at home and abroad, have the kind sympathy of many friends, as only a little over a year ago they were also bereft of a dear sister and daughter, Carrie. J. B. L. CLARK

In memory of the late J. B. L. Clark, who suddenly passed away at his residence in Cleveland, Ohio, on February 2nd, was born at Tryon, P. E. I., 73 years ago. With his parents, they moved to Summerside in the year 1862.

After leaving school, he accepted a position as clerk in the general store of the late Hon. James Mulrond and in 1873 he started with T. H. Robblee, he company a dry Goods Store under the name of Clark & Robblee, which business they conducted for a number of years.

Leaving Summerside some 25 years ago, he came to Cleveland and opened a dairy lunch business, being about the first to engage in

that line of business in Cleveland. From a small beginning his business prospered and at the time of his death, he was serving some twelve thousand people daily and doing a business of some two million dollars yearly. He adopted as his slogan, "Cleanliness and Quality." "We never close," which was faithfully carried out.

The late Mr. Clark was known to thousands of the leading citizens, who for years were patrons of his different restaurants.

He leaves to mourn, his widow, Amanda M., eldest daughter of the Nelson Cannon of Shediac, N. B.; also five sons and five daughters.

The business is still being conducted by his sons, namely: S. A. R. DeBlois, A. Y. and Russell, J. A., the other son, conducts a like business in the city of Chicago. He also leaves three brothers: John W. and S. Hall, on P. E. I., and A. Y., in Boston.

His funeral was held and largely attended in the Wade Memorial Chapel and the remains laid to rest under a blanket of flowers in beautiful Lake View cemetery.

To know him was a pleasure—broad minded and generous, always ready to serve a meal gratis to the needy traveler.

AFTER LEMON EXTRACT SELLERS IN ST. JOHN

ST. JOHN, June 18.—The case against ten well-known wholesale grocery and drug companies and firms of this city charged with having in their places of business intoxicating liquor (lemon extract) for sale, was taken up in the police court yesterday before Magistrate Ritchie. Liquor Inspector McAlmish gave evidence of making the charge and told of taking of lemon and vanilla extract from each firm. He said he had visited the different firms on his own authority.

The accused all protested that they were doing nothing contrary to the law, and that this was the first intimation they had received to that effect. They said that if the selling and manufacturing of lemon extract was contrary to the Prohibition Act, they were willing to discontinue its sale and manufacture. The magistrate informed them that according to a decision given by Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen, lemon extract and any other used as a beverage, containing more than two per cent. alcohol, was liquor under the meaning of the act and anybody dealing in such liquors was liable.

Representatives of the various concerns said that they were willing and eager to abide by the law, but they wished to know what the law was in the matter and they asked if the sale was to be banned in the city, but the magistrate could not promise them this. As one of them expressed it, the liquor inspectors had not been fulfilling their oath, as they should, according to this interpretation of the act, have laid a charge against every grocer in the city long ago. If the sale were not banned, the magistrate thought that they would be open to fines whenever a liquor inspector took the notion to enter their places of business and charge them with selling extracts as beverages. The case was postponed until Monday, June 28, to have the bottles taken by the inspector examined by the provincial analyst.
