POPULATION OF CHINA IS CUT 15,000,000

PEKING, Aug. 18—The latest census of China, compiled by the Ministry of the Interior, shows the population to be 474,787,000. This is 15,000,000 less than the post office estimates of 1926.

Due to disorders in several parts of China at present, the latest estimate is considered approximate.

Dr. Warren S. Thompson, Lead of the Scripps Foundation for Study of Population Problems, who recently completed a year in China, declared that it is possible to say only that the population of China is somewhere between 350 and 500 millions.

PRIMATE'S DAUGHTER WED AT WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, Aug. 18—With her father, Archbishop Matheson, primate emeritus of Canada, officiating, Nora Matheson was quietly married here to Major D. M. Duncan 63-year-old war veteran and superintendent of Winnipeg schools. Close friends and relatives attended the ceremony.

The bride's father has for almost a generation ranked as one of the great figures of the Church of England in Canada. He resigned from the primacy in January of this year.

To-day's bride is the daughter of the archbishop's first wife, who died in 1897. In 1906 he was married again to Alice E. Talbot.


