The employees, the employer and the state must contribute. Without elaborating on it, the Federal Minister said one per cent of all the wages and salaries paid annually in Canada, would amount to \$25,000,000.

INDUSTRY MUST LEAD

Industry must take a leading part in the battle against depression, continued Dr. Manion. The Dominion, Provincial and municipal governments were able to do only so much—after that point other agencies must enter the lists. For one thing, industry must change its tempo of production.

HEAVY BY BURDEN

Dail Favors Military Court

DUBLIN, Oct. 15.—The draft public safety bill sponsored by President William T. Cosgrave's government and providing for the establishment of military courts to try persons charged with sedition or outrages was carried a step nearer passage last night when the Dail passed it by 81 to 68 on a closure motion to end debate.

Charges that the "Irish republican army" had been in communication with Russian agents with a view to establishing a Soviet republic in Ireland were made during the long debate on the floor.

President Cosgrave said that organizers had gone to Russia to receive training there and Minister of Justice Kenney read from a document which he said was sent from Russia by Sean Russell, Quartermaster-General of the "I. R. A." to a member of the Dail in which reference was made to establishing communication between Russia and Ireland by way of Berlin. The document, he said, alluded "mysteriously" to air defense guns, and gas masks.
