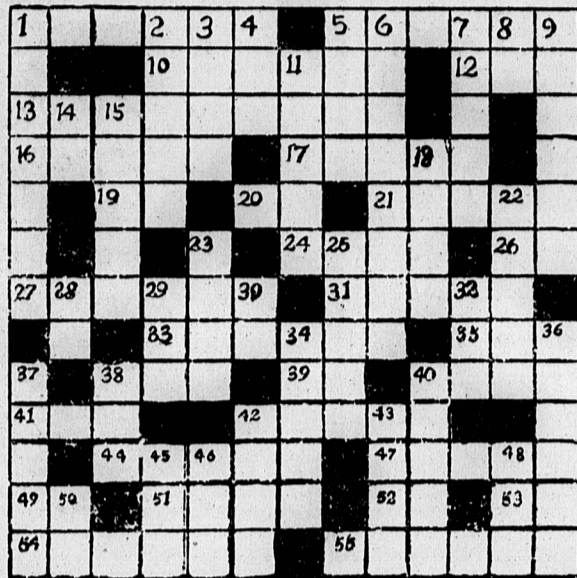

FEDERAL GRANTS URGED TO EXPAND TOURIST TRADE

Development of Canada as a mecca for tourists of the world was urged by speakers at a banquet held here last night in honor of delegates attending the first annual convention of the Canadian Association of Tourist and Publicity Bureau.
Mayor Bert Wemp of Toronto expressed a hope that the trans-Canada highway would soon be completed as he believed it would be a real link in binding the provinces of the Dominion together and a great boon to tourist traffic.

JUDGE ARSENAULT

Hon. Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, president of the Association and also head of the Prince Edward Island Publicity Association, presided during Monday's opening session, which was addressed by Hon. W. R. Clubb, Manitoba Minister of Public Works, who welcomed the visitors on behalf of the province. Mayor Ralph Webb of Winnipeg tendered the city's greetings.
Hon. Mr. Clubb told the delegates that in their hands rested the future of the second largest industry in Canada, and one in which could be visualized boundless possibilities.
