The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade will be held tomorrow night.

The new measure for the enforcement of prohibition in Maine is working well. Last week a large quantity of liquor said to be alcohol disguised as patent medicine, was seized in the wholesale establishment of Hon. Mr. Cobb, governor of the state.

The admiralty court a few days ago fixed the bail on the steamer Albano, for the collision with the Parisian, at \$22,000 on the vessel and a similar amount for injury to the cargo, a total of \$164,000. The Parisian is now on an even keel and will be towed into the dry dock for repairs.

THE Moncton hospital will soon have among its equipment an up-to-date ambulance similar to the one being constructed for G. Dudley Wright in this city. An order for the wagon, which will have ball bearing axles and rubber tires, has been given to a local builder, and all the necessary furnishings have been ordered. The wagon and its furnishings will cost in the vicinity of \$500.

He will have a staff of expert men in connection and great results should ensue.

BISHOP CASEY, who is a passenger on the new turbine steamer Virginia, will be home this week after his visit to Rome and the Holy Land. The executive which is arranging details of the welcome to be given him by the Roman Catholics of the city, met last night in St. Malachi's Hall. The address to be read was received and ordered engrossed. There was also some discussion as to a parade, and this matter will be taken up again next Wednesday night. — St. John Sun.

At a recent meeting of Heather Division, No 225, Sons of Temperance the following Resolution was unanimously passed. Whereas, at the last session of the Grand Division of this Province, a resolution was passed setting forth certain amendments and alterations which are considered necessary to the proper and efficient enforcement of the Provincial Prohibitory Law, and whereas, the said amendments will be placed before the coming session of the Local Legislature. Therefore Resolved, that we the officers and members of Heather Division, place on record our endorsement of the said amendments and earnestly hope and pray that the Government will see fit to give this matter the consideration that it deserves. Further Resolved, that we hereby solicit in support of the said amendments the co-operation of our Second District Representatives.

ONE of Quebec's most popular and most enterprising citizens was on Saturday last the object of a demonstration which will long be remembered by the large number of citizens present to tender their congratulations to Mr. Victor Chateauvert, who was celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of his entry into the establishment of J. B. Renaud & Cie. Born in Quebec on the 12th March, 1841, young Chateauvert fourteen years after, on the 26th March, 1855, presented himself to Mr. Renaud for a position in his store. As the lad's appearance was very satisfactory to the head of the firm he was taken as a junior clerk and since that day Mr. Chateauvert has never left the firm, but through his determination and energy, worked his way up until he succeeded in being taken in as a partner. The occasion was not to be allowed to pass by, without some mark of appreciation on the part of his fellow citizens, his friends and staff of both establishments. The demonstration was attended by about seventy-five friends and merchants and a staff consisting of thirty employees who all drove out to the country residence of Mr. Chateauvert, on the St. Foy road, and presented him with a number of addresses, accompanied by very rich presents. The staff went out in the evening, while the others met at Mr. Chateauvert's residence shortly after three o'clock, all being received by Mr. Chateauvert and his three sons. — Quebec Chronicle.

DOMINION liner Canada sailed on Friday for Halifax with 1,200 passengers, including 350 second cabin. The emigrants on board were of a very superior class. They came from various parts of the United Kingdom. There are numerous young men and women from the agricultural districts bound for Winnipeg, also a party of children from the Children's Home, Honor Road, London, and another party of adults sent out by an East End emigration.
