Ottawa has a system of water supply which is excellent in its way, but which failed at a critical moment during the recent big fire. The water is taken from the Ottawa river above the falls and is forced through the mains by a system of powerful turbine water wheels. In time of fire the pressure is increased by the application of additional power. At the late fire one of the large mains burst under the strain of increased pressure and thus at a most critical moment the fire department was practically paralysed. But repairs were speedily effected, and the wind which had been blowing heavily fell away, so that the fire was got under control. None the less a large portion of the capital had a very narrow escape from destruction.

The terms on which the big strike in Montreal was ended are said to be satisfactory on both sides. The men gain something in the way of advanced wages, but the labor union missed its main point of excluding non-union workers from the ship loading business. Some of them also lose the places they had and will have more precarious chances of employment for the future. Many workers were brought in during the trouble from outside and given a guarantee of continuous employment for the navigation season. These now have the inside track. The strike was a most regrettable occurrence from which both parties lost heavily, while the interruption to business was severely felt by many who had no direct connection with the trouble. We infer from the published accounts that the union laborers, in proportion to their ability to bear it were really the heaviest losers. It is to be hoped that the lesson may prove a salutary one all round and that so like trouble may recur for years to come in Montreal.
