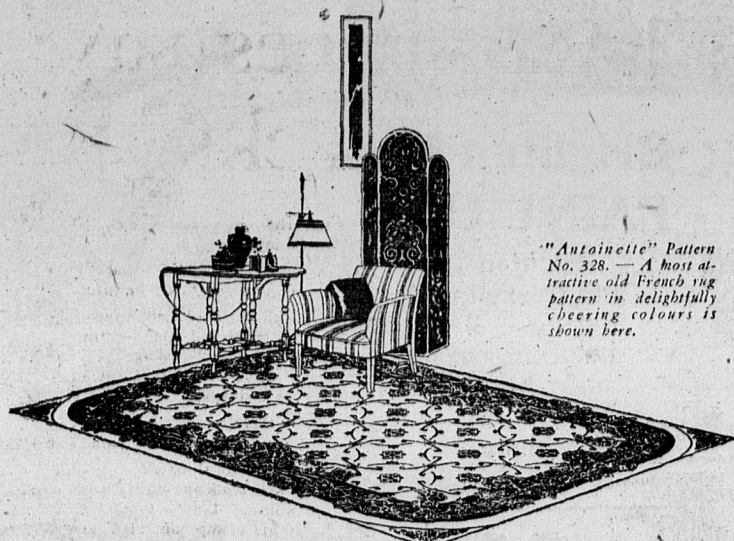


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"Antoinette" Pattern No. 328. — A host of attractive old French rug patterns in delightfully cheering colours is shown here.

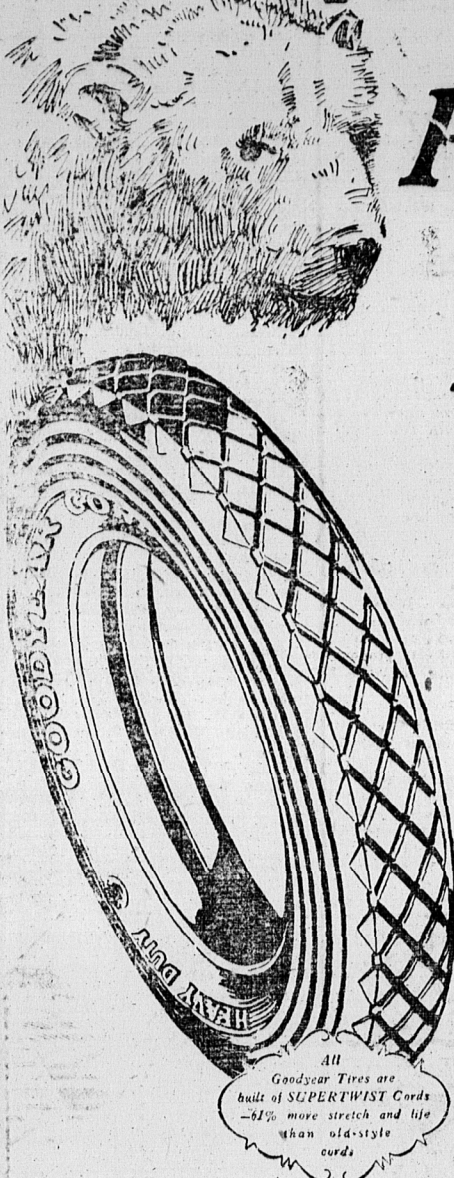
