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**Cause of Von Tirpitz Resignation**

LONDON, March 18.—The Daily Telegraph publishes the following from its correspondent at Milan.

"The Italian press hints that the reason for the retirement of Admiral Von Tirpitz, was that the Admiral had become mad, and advocated the sinking of every ship on the high seas, regardless of whether they belonged to belligerents or neutrals."

"This point seems to be borne out by the sinking of the Tubantia which was effected before new instructions could be sent to submarine commanders by Admiral Von Capelle."

LONDON, March 18.—A despatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Amsterdam says the German newspapers freely discuss the resignation of Admiral Von Tirpitz, which they ascribe to Albert Ballin, director-general of the Hamburg-American Line. They declare that Herr Ballin warned Emperor William that a continuance of the submarine campaign, on Von Tirpitz's plan, would mean the seizure of all German vessels in neutral ports, and finally alienate South America from Germany.

LONDON, March 18.—A wireless despatch from Rome says that the retirement of Admiral Von Tirpitz, as German minister of marine, was occasioned by his intention to attack Great Britain with the entire German navy. His plan was vetoed, according to these advices by Emperor William and Prince Henry.

**AMERICAN STEAMER  
LOST OFF SOUTH  
CAROLINA COAST**

NEW YORK, March 17.—News was received in this city late today that the steamship Kanawha, bound for Sao Janelro by way of Norfolk, Va., had sunk at sea. A boat load of sailors from the Kanawha was picked up by the steamer Santa Maria.

A wireless message from the Santa Maria, received by the United Fruit Company through the news of the disaster. The message stated that the Kanawha sank last night off the South Carolina coast and that the Santa Maria had rescued 21 members of the crew. Another boatload of Kanawha sailors—consisting of the third officer and seven men, was still missing when the Santa Maria reported, but it was said that the steamer is continuing the search for the missing. The message from the Santa Maria follows:

"Nine thirty p. m., March 16, in latitude 33.03, longitude 73.42 picked up captain and twenty men of the crew of S. S. Kanawha, which sank at five p. m. Third officer, W. J. O'Reilly, first assistant engineer Carl Hamburg, O. F. Klyon, Olaf Hanson and Frank E. Vatovec and fireman F. B. Batch, J. Kollus, missing."

The Kanawha sailed from here March 11 for Norfolk, Port Arthur and Rio Janelro with coal. She was a steel steamer of 2,182 tons goods, 240 feet long with 273 feet beam. She was built in 1902 at Port Huron, and was owned by I. Powell of New Orleans. She was commanded by Captain Bertam A. Rigoulo. She was formerly in service on the Great Lakes.

The Santa Maria of the United Fruit Line, sailed from New York on March 15 for Colon.

**Germany Educates Children to be Mere War Machines**

AMSTERDAM, via London, March 20.—The Cologne-Gazette gives the following account of the turbulent scene which occurred in the Reichstag on Thursday, while Dr. Klotz, Liebknecht, Socialist, denounced the demoralizing effects of the war.

Dr. Liebknecht, discussing the educational budget, said—

"Education to-day serves to strengthen militarism and capitalism. You act as if you wish to throw open to the people the road to education; but that is only because capitalism requires soldiers."

"The teaching of history is systematically distorted for the purpose, introducing certain political convictions into the school and also hatred against England. The militarism of schools converts them into training stables for war. You educate your children to be war machines."

"With regard to war, their ideals seem to be embodied in poison gas bombs. In the schools should be taught, not only that the murder of Archduke Ferdinand of Austria at Sarajevo was an incident which should inspire horror, but it should also be taught that there were wide circles in Germany and Austria, in which this murder was regarded as a veritable God-send."

"At these words a wild uproar arose in the House, the President vigorously ringing his bell. Dr. Liebknecht shouted, 'It is the truth! It's the whole truth!'

The President thereon called him to order, and the majority of the members left the chamber.

Dr. Liebknecht went on: "Just as in the thirty years' war, so the present war has a demoralizing and baneful effect on education. As long as our educational ideal centres in a death struggle, the liberation of the working classes cannot come."

The President, for the second time, called the speaker to order, but he continued:

"The workers themselves must tackle the job of education. The troops must not fight merely in the trenches; they ought to lower their arms and direct them against the common enemy."

The President again rang the bell. Dr. Liebknecht tried to continue, but the President kept on ringing his bell and said, addressing the members: "I beg that all those present who still wish to hear Dr. Liebknecht will stand up."

As only Socialists stood up, Dr. Liebknecht was forbidden to speak further the majority present loudly applauding this decision.

Dr. Liebknecht, however, continued in his efforts to speak, but could not make himself heard, owing to the terrific commotion. As he was leaving the rostrum there were loud shouts of "Out with him!"

**German Policy To Sink on Sight An Uter Failure**

LONDON, March 20.—With two weeks of the new German submarine campaign against Great Britain already passed, it is asserted on high authority that, so far, it has proved an utter failure. Since March 1, when the Germans were supposed to have entered upon their fresh activities in British waters, the actual number of ships torpedoed has been relatively fewer than before.

When the Germans announced that they intended sinking British ships indiscriminately, the British authorities replied that the Germans had been trying to do that same thing ever since the war began, and that only the vigilance of the British navy had prevented their succeeding in the measure desired. The logic of that argument is proved, the Times correspondent's informant said to-day, by the fact that the Germans have been unable to make any headway with the renewed campaign. It is not denied that a flock of German submarines has been let loose since March 1. The fact is, they have come out into the North Sea, but the most of their activity has been in sowing mines, which they have been attempting to do on a gigantic scale. The British navy has not been idle, however, while this mine-strewing has been going on.

In connection with the failure of the new German submarine war, it is recalled here that exactly the same situation exists now in Germany as in the earlier phase of the submarine warfare, when the difference of views of Admiral von Tirpitz and Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg resulted in the Admiral's contracting an illness which was supposed to be diplomatic. Von Tirpitz is now reported ill once more. It is thought that the Chancellor's opposition, to some degree at least, may account for the apparent lull in the submarine campaign against merchant vessels, although reports that Germany had postponed the new campaign in deference to America is not credited here. In any case, the British naval experts express the fullest confidence in the ability of the navy to prevent such decimation of British ships as Captain Persius and other German prophets predicted would reduce the British to starvation within two months of March 1.

**France pending 90,000,000 a Day Without Murmur**

PARIS, March 20.—Although France spent more than 22,000,000,000 francs in 1915, the financial situation is satisfactory, thanks to the French internal loan, which is being maintained above the rate of issue, said Felix Ribot, Minister of Finance, during a discussion of the appropriations required for the second quarter of 1916, in the Chamber of Deputies to-day.

With but one dissenting vote, the chamber adopted the credit of 7,800,000,000 francs for the second quarter. This is equivalent to a daily expenditure of 87,000,000 francs.

Minister Ribot said that while France would soon be spending 90,000,000 francs a day, England would be spending 110,000,000, and she is able to support the imposition of new taxes much better, because France is concerned with the difficulty of purchasing abroad supplies such as coal, grain and meat for the army and civil population.

The rate of exchange, he said, is going up, but the necessary credit has been obtained. Importations, Minister Ribot declared, must be reduced. France, he continued, is resolved to pay its debts, hard as this may be.

What ought to be done, Minister Ribot concluded, is to increase the tax on liquor and alcohol. As to an income tax, he said, a greater one than that now being collected could not be demanded at a time when fortune is an uncertainty.

**PREMIER ASQUITH WILL BE QUESTIONED ON PEACE CONFERENCE**

LONDON, March 20.—Premier Asquith will be asked in the Commons on Thursday, whether the Government will participate in the conference of all powers to discuss peace terms, the Exchange Telegraph declares.
