## GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

(Continued From the Third Page) which brings this item up to the \$1,500 aimed at by the General Assembly, and also in part makes up a shortage from last year.

### OTTAWA LADIES' COLLEGE.

The report of the Presbyterian Ladies' College, Ottawa, presented by the Rev. Dr. Herridge, was brief and to the point. The session has been in every respect satisfactory. There has been an increase in the number of pupils and a corresponding increase in revenue. The number of pupils enrolled during the year is a hundred and fifty-eight. Of these 45 were in residence. The estimate revenue is \$15,125.

### BOOK OF PRAISE SALES.

Dr. Gregg and Professor McLaren brought before the court matters relating to the publication of the Book of Praise. The sales made and the royalty received during the year have been much larger than those of the preceding year. The sales have increased from 44,000 to 64,000, and the royalty from \$1,200 to \$1,700. Of the royalty received, \$1,500 has been placed in the hands of the general agent of the church, to be apportioned, \$1,000 to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund and \$500 to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Progress was reported in the matter of preparing a new metrical version of the Psalms.

### TERMS OF ELDERS.

The Rev. S. H. Gray assistant to the Rev. Dr. Laing, of Dundas was given full standing in the Presbytery of Hamilton after which came an overture from the Presbytery of Owen Sound looking in the direction of such a change in the constitution of the church as would enable those congregations that desire it to have a term service rather than a life service in the eldership. The matter came to the General Assembly with the disapproval of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston.

Dr. J. B. Fraser supported the overture with Dr. Somerville. After their addresses numerous questions were asked. Professor Scrimger counselled the assembly not to move too rapidly in the matter.

Dr. Thompson, of Sarnia, and Principal Forrest, of Halifax, moved that the General Assembly express its judgement in accordance with the judgement expressed by the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, and virtually dismiss the subject.

Elder McQueen spoke against the overture, and the Rev. Henry Gracey spoke in its favor.

Dr. Campbell, of Montreal, and the Rev. John McDougall were against it; so were Principal MacVicar and Elder Holt. A large majority of the Assembly voted against the overture as presented, to be sent down to the different Presbyteries in terms of the Barrier Act. But when a proposal by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, of Toronto, was submitted to send the matter down as remit to Presbyteries, to be reported upon a year hence, the Assembly sustained the proposal by a majority of two.

Dr. Sedgewick and Principal Forrest proposed that further discussion on this subject should be postponed until a kindred matter, to be presented to the Assembly, should be before the house, but the Assembly, by a majority of six in a vote participated in by a hundred and fifty-four of the commissioners, ordered the Presbyteries to examine the matter for a twelvemonth, and report their judgment to the Assembly of 1902.

The General Assembly accepted an invitation sent to the commissioners individually by the Department of Agriculture, to visit the Experimental Farm; and another for Saturday afternoon to an excursion by electricity to Britannia-on-the-Bay, the rifle Ranges, and the scenery about Ottawa.

### HOME MISSIONS.

The church was full when the assembly took up the subject of Home Missions. The Rev. G. S. Carson and Professor Calkin were the representatives of the Maritime section of the Dominion in presenting matters relating to home missions. Forty-six missionaries were employed during the summer. During the past year about thirty congregations were under the care of ordained missionaries. The total receipts for the carrying on of this work amounted to \$14,000, with a small balance on the wrong side of the account as the year ended.

Dr. Robertson appeared before the Assembly in the interests of home missions as conducted between the Province of Quebec and Vancouver Island inclusive. The year has been one of encouraging success. The operations in the Yukon, in New Ontario, among the Galicians, Doukhobors, and Mormons were rehearsed in turn by him and Dr. Hurdman, of Calgary. Thirty-nine laborers were secured in Great Britain for home mission work last year. The inflow of immigration to the North-West last year was the largest since the early eighties. Over seventy thousands came in within the year. The Presbytery of Portage la Prairie must be divided into two and the Presbytery of Regina into three to meet the growing requirement of the work. The student missionary societies in the furnished supplies for 37 fields last year, at an expense

of \$70,000 used by these societies. As a whole was carried on at an expense for the year of \$80,500. Stirring addresses were given by the Rev. Dr. Reid, missionary to the Galicians and Doukhobors on Manitoba and the North West. The Slav population is now nearly 50,000. Mr. R. W. Gavin, Hamilton, gave an excellent presentation of his work among the Mormons within the bounds of the Presbytery of Calgary, and Mr. Arch. MacVicar an equally acceptable presentation of mission work among the lumber camps.

It was announced from the chair that someone, whose name was withheld, offered a sum sufficient to supply half the support needed for an assistant to Dr. Robertson, as field secretary, and a resolution was presented asking the Assembly to sanction such an appointment leaving it to the Home Mission Committee to name the man, state and salary and arrange further details during the year. But objection was taken to this summary procedure, and the motion proposed was changed to a notice of motion for a future sederunt.

### FRENCH LOCOMOTIVES.

It is now the French. The chief assistant engineer of the Orleans railway states that the company will buy no more American locomotives. He says the thirty purchased last year were bought because they were needed in a hurry. For this reason the company does not regret the purchase; but the experiment is not encouraging, and the company does not contemplate further purchases except in similar circumstances, as the French locomotives are equally satisfactory and more economical.
