**Costly Gifts Are Offered Princess**

LONDON, Oct. 8—(CP)—Princess Elizabeth has taken a firm stand against publishing lists of wedding gifts too far ahead of the Royal Wedding on Nov. 20.

Her Highness is most anxious not to embarrass those who have not yet been able to offer gifts, an official at Buckingham Palace said. "She has therefore decided that no list shall be issued until a short time before the wedding."

It was also stated that no invitations to the wedding have yet been sent out though some of the palace staff are working overtime on the guest list.

At Westminster Abbey holds no more than 2,000 people, many eligible guests will have to be eliminated. These will be entertained by the King and Queen at an afternoon party in St. James's Palace on Nov. 17 when the wedding gifts will be viewed. The following evening there will be a pre-wedding party at Buckingham Palace.

Meanwhile, offers of costly gifts continue to reach the Princess from many parts of the world. From Capetown she will receive a set of early Georgian Sheffield plate candleabra; from Victoria, Australia, a £500 (£2,400) jewel case made of Victorian time gold engraved with the coat of arms of Victoria.

**Other Gifts**

President and Mme. Chiang Kai-shek will present the royal couple with a 200-piece dinner service specially ordered from Kingtchen, world-famous chinaware.

**INVALID COOKERY**

**BEEF BROTH**

One pound chuck or neck; one pound bones; one quart water; salt. Wipe meat with damp cloth; cut into inch cubes; break bones; cover meat and bones with cold water; let stand one hour; put over low flame and bring gradually to the boiling point; let simmer from three to four hours; season.

The amount of broth should equal one quart when finished. If a fat free broth is desired, let broth get thoroughly cold and remove solidified fat from the top.

**CREAM OF WHEAT GREL**

Two tablespoons of cream of wheat; one pint water; salt. Place water and salt in top of double boiler and bring to boiling-point, gradually add the cream of wheat and cook briskly over the flame three minutes, stirring constantly. Place in double boiler and cook 1 1/2 hours.

**EGG NOG**

Three-quarters cup milk or milk and cream; one egg; one tablespoon sugar; one-half teaspoon vanilla; salt. Beat egg, add sugar, salt, vanilla and milk and blend thoroughly. Ingredients should be well chilled before combining.
