Grand Jury Report To The Chief Justice

Following is the report of the Grand Jury delivered at the July term of the Supreme Court for King's County held at Georgetown on Tuesday, with Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presiding:

"May it please Your Lordship: We the Grand Jury at the Supreme Court have inspected the Jail and found the following: The jail quarters require new mattresses due to filthy conditions of same. Springs of cots in bad condition, causing pain to be torn in several places. These are urgently needed. We recommend strongly that these men should have at least a pint of milk each day as the health of most of prisoners is poor and being impaired further from lack of a proper eating diet. We found the Court House in good condition and the services of the Jailor, satisfactory. There are five prisoners in jail at the present time. According to observations some of above recommendations have been made before. We hereby stress action on suggestions -
