THE COOK'S CORNER

ROAST GOOSE
Select a goose that is about a year old and one that weighs about 8 to 10 pounds. Singe and remove any pinfeathers, then draw and wipe out the cavity carefully and sprinkle the inside with salt. Cut off the neck, leaving only about 1 inch of skin. Tie or sew up the opening. Stuff the goose with any desired stuffing, place on a rack in an open roasting pan and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 20 to 25 minutes per pound. Baste the bird about every 20 minutes during the baking. Don't cover during the cooking unless the bird is old or tough and in that case a cover may be placed on the roaster while cooking.

A potato dressing is good with goose, or one in which some kind of dried fruit is used. The dressing should contain both.

POTATO RAISIN DRESSING
3 cup bread crumbs
2 cups hot mashed potatoes
1-2 cups seeded raisins
1-2 cup chopped onion
1-2 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon pepper

Method: Mash freshly boiled potatoes and then combine with the bread crumbs, raisins, chopped onion and the seasonings. If the dressing seems too dry, it may be moistened with a little warm water and a little melted butter may be added if desired. Mix all together thoroughly and use to stuff the goose.

Mock Hollandaise Sauce
3 tablespoons butter
1-2 cups milk
2 egg yolks (or 1 egg)
1 tablespoon butter
3 tablespoons flour
Salt to taste
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Melt the tablespoons butter, blend in flour. Add milk gradually and cook, stirring until mixture thickens. Season with salt. Pour some of hot sauce over beaten egg yolks. Add to sauce. Cook 2 minutes. Remove from heat and add lemon juice, and 1 tablespoon butter.

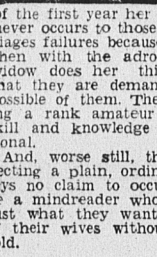

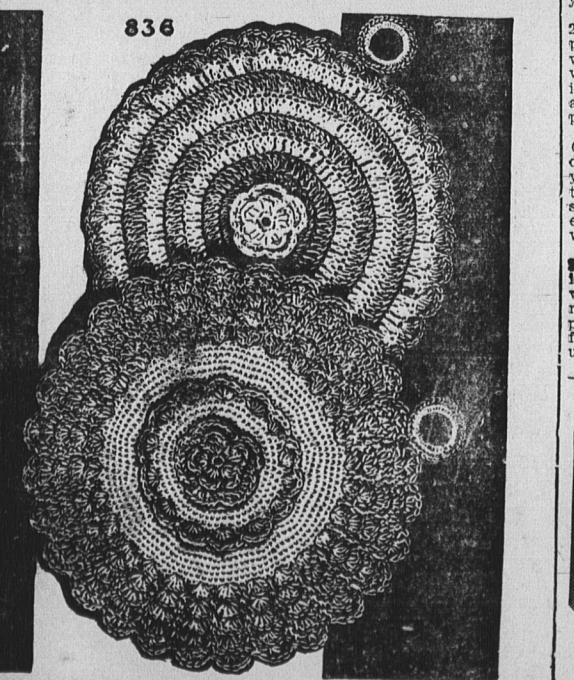

Twenty to 25 minutes to a pound is the time required to roast pork in a slow oven. Pork should be roasted in a quick oven. Cooked in a quiet oven the outside is seared over and heat is prevented from penetrating into the center.

Scatter wood ashes on top of snow on lawns. When snow melts ashes will fertilize soil.

If the cement floor of your cellar has a rough finish, paint with a special paint used for this purpose and sold by paint dealers.

Just Use Dishcloths and Tape

Wouldn't you love to make this gay, tri-color knitting bag? It's woven on ordinary dishcloths!

You first thumbtack to a breadboard a dishcloth about 15 inches square. Then you thread bright-colored bias binding tape through a bobby pin and weave over and under the dishcloth meshes. Orange, dark blue and red tapes are a pretty combination.

Start weaving at the upper right hand corner of your dishcloth with any color tape. In your second row change colors and go over the meshes you went under in your first row. In the third row, change color and weave in order again. Repeat until 11 inches are filled, then weave another dishcloth for the other side of the bag.

Your bag needs a handle, too, so cut a piece of dishcloth, 3 1/2 inches wide by 15 inches long, and then weave. Now trim all the tape ends, sew the two sides together, turn inside out, and sew handle on. Line the whole bag with bright blue satin.
