8 Canadians On R.A.F. list Of casualties

LONDON, May 5—(Monday)—(CP Cable)—8 Canadians were listed in the 6th Royal Air Force casualty list, issued by the Air Ministry today and containing 341 names.

The Canadians and their next of kin: Killed in action: Crooks, Acting Flt. Lt. David Alexander C. Mrs. A. D. Crooks (mother), Toronto.

Presumed killed in action: Benzie, PO J. John Benzie (father), Winnipeg; Anderson, Flt. Lt. H. T. J. Mrs. K. Anderson (mother), Winnipeg. Wife resides in England.

Missing: Burgess, PO J. T. native of Ottawa, by Joseph Burgess (father), Montreal; Farmer, Sgt. D. G. born in Vancouver, wife lives in York, England. He is on active service; Horie, LAC L. R., father lives in Vancouver; Seddon, FO J. W., born in Vancouver, wife lives in Bristol, England.

Presumed killed on active service: Denison, PO A. C., Herbert Denison (father), Vernon, B. C.; Acting Flt. Lt. Crooks distinguished himself for his reconnaissance of the Amiens-Albert Road in May 1940.
