New Gov. General For Can.

REPORTS FROM ENGLAND INDICATE THAT EITHER EARL OF ATHLONE OR VISCOUNT LASCELLES WILL BE NEXT GOV. GENERAL.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 24.—"Reliable reports reaching Ottawa from England indicate that either the Earl of Athlone, retiring Governor-General of the Union of South Africa, or Viscount Lascelles, only son-in-law of King George and Queen Mary, will be the next Governor-General of Canada," says the Ottawa Evening Citizen in a feature story today. The term of His Excellency, Viscount Willingdon, as Governor-General of the Dominion, expires on August 5, next year. The Earl of Athlone is the brother of Her Majesty Queen Mary. Viscount Lascelles is the husband of Princess Mary.

The Citizen says it is understood on good authority that Premier Bennett consulted with King George regarding Viscount Willingdon's successor while in England attending the Imperial Conference and thus a definite announcement in the matter may be expected in the near future.

Throne Tottering

Is Arrested On Forgery Charge

Man Who Is Alleged To Have Passed Worthless Checks In This City Arrested On Release From Dorchester Penitentiary.

Charged with forgery and with obtaining goods under false pretenses, Bruce A. Howland, 22, alias B. R. Roberts' North Devon, York County, N. B., was arrested yesterday by Constable Watson Higgins in Moncton, and brought to Charlottetown last evening. The arrest followed Howland's release from imprisonment at Dorchester where he has been serving a sentence since January 23 last on a charge of forgery for which he had been arrested in Moncton on January 4.

Howland, it is alleged, forged cheques on certain local merchants, and obtained certain articles under false pretenses, among them a ladies fur trimmed coat, an overcoat, a suit of clothes and a fountain pen, all of which have been recovered, and which were found in his possession at the time of his arrest last winter.

On receiving complaints on January 3 last, from local merchants who had been victims of the operations of a man answering the description of Howland, and who gave his name as B. R. Roberts' the police forwarded the description to mainland points as the man had absconded from the province. As he stepped from the train at Moncton on January 14 he was apprehended by the police of that city, and was later sentenced by His Honor J. W. Bennett to one year in Dorchester Penitentiary.

Howland is of slim build, clean shaven, about five feet nine inches tall with dark hair. He has a scar on his nose. When arrested by Constable Higgins he was very poorly clad.

May Be Forced To Muzzle His Roosters

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Nov. 24.—A court order restraining John Webster's roosters from crowing between 10 p. m. and 7.30 a. m. was signed today by Vice-Chancellor John J. Fallon.

The injunction was issued at the behest of George Becker, a neighbor of Webster in Ridgefield, who said the crowing disturbed his sleep and injured his health.

"Will the court inform me," Webster asked after the injunction had been signed, "how I am to keep my roosters from crowing?"

"You'll have to figure that out for yourself," the court answered.

Attempt To Assassinate Irish General

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Nov. 24.—What appeared to have been an attempt to assassinate General Richard Mulcahy, Minister of local government and public health occurred here tonight. The General escaped injury, but one of his guards was wounded. The incident was shrouded in secrecy, but it is understood that General Mulcahy and some of his friends were about to enter the residence of Professor Hayes, Speaker of the Dail Eireann, when shots were fired. General Mulcahy's guard returned the fire and men were seen running.

Heavy Potato Export

1,620,580 BUSHELS SHIPPED FROM PROV. BY WATER; 1,308 CARS BY RAIL.

To date this season 1,620,580 bushels of potatoes have been shipped from the province by water in steamers leaving the ports of Charlottetown, Georgetown, Victoria, and Summerside. There has also been shipped by steamer 59,032 bushels of turnips.

1,308 cars of potatoes have to date been shipped from the province.

Thousands Are Made Homeless; Heavy Death Toll

Practically All Of Europe Suffering From Floods And Hurricanes—Worst Storm In 20 Years—Steamer Sinks With Loss Of 31 Lives.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—A gale still howled across Europe tonight and driving rains which pelted a region already stricken by floods and hurricanes, made thousands homeless and wrought enormous property damage. Thirty one men were lost when the steamer Louis Leonhardt went down in the Elbe Estuary in Germany; three were killed as a hurricane swept through Vienna and at least one person was drowned as the rivers of France poured over the countryside.

Worst in 20 Years

In France a desperate populace called it the worst flood since the disastrous one of November, 1910. In Belgium half a million acres of farm land were under water. In Germany, the Rhine and Moselle had driven thousands from their homes. In Holland the dikes were crumbling along the river Scheldt. In Austria, towns and villages suffered heavily from wind and water. In England or off its coast vessels scurried to the assistance of two Greek steamers driven inshore by the gale, but both ships, the Triton and the Taxisars, worked themselves out of danger under their own power. In Spain, the storm was less severe. Railroads were halted in Bavaria and many other regions, because trees and telephone poles were flung across the tracks. The gale was bitter cold and the homeless suffered also from lack of food. The Red Cross was in the field early starting its relief campaign.

Fall Of Labor Govt.

IS PREDICTED—SUGGESTED THAT SIR OSWALD MOSLEY IS TO LEAD OPEN LEFT-WING REVOLTA AGAINST MACDONALD ADMINISTRATION.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Political uncertainty at Westminster has been vastly increased within the last week or so by the development of political squabbles within the Labor party. The suggestion that Sir Oswald Mosley, the erstwhile chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, is going to lead an open left wing revolt, is not regarded within government circles with the same concern as it manifested elsewhere.

Conservative quarters even prefer to see the early collapse of the government. The Labor ministers are apprehensive over developments, including the Maxtonite participation in the East Renfrew by-election on behalf of the "excommunicated" candidate, chiefly because the ministers see Labor's prestige being lowered in the country, but they ridicule the idea of an early downfall of the government.

The Clydeside left-wingers were busy in East Renfrew over the weekend. "Our position is unaltered," said George Buchanan, M.P., one of the left-wingers this morning, while James Maxton, M.P., their head, said he had not heard of any settlement between the government and Irwin and added he intended to stay in the district until polling day.

These well-meant efforts on behalf of a comrade, however, are being appreciated by the Scottish Independent Labor party. Its chairman, Patrick Dellan, stated today: "Our council would be able to negotiate much more effectively with a view to composing our differences if the members of Parliament, now in East Renfrew, would refrain from issuing bulletins which are incendiary in tone and have nothing to do with the dispute."

Canucks Will Be Barred

FROM ENTERING THE COUNTRY AS IMMIGRANTS FOR TWO YEARS—UNEMPLOYMENT CONDITIONS RESPONSIBLE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 24.—After July 1 next, Canadians may be barred from entering the United States as immigrants for a period of two years. A rapid canvass of the House and Senate this morning indicated the distinct probability of passage at the session of Congress, beginning next Monday of Senator David A. Reed's resolution to prohibit immigration because of unemployment conditions.

The resolution would bar all immigrants except relatives of persons already resident in the United States. Visitors, business men and students would not be kept out, but all those intending permanent residence would have to wait for two years. The Senator expects passage in the Senate almost unanimously, and the Restrictionists in the House are expected to fight for the privilege of introducing the resolution. Opponents will probably come from the State Department, but with popular sentiment aroused by the present unemployment situation the administration is not expected to law much of a fight.

Oil Tanker Had Liquor Aboard

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 24.—Collector of the port, Emery J. San Souci announced this morning that he had been notified that the British oil tanker "Good Luck" seized off Block Island with liquor aboard yesterday, would dock at the State pier under coastguard convoy. The collector said he had no information as to the circumstances of the seizure, the amount of liquor involved, or what action against the boat or her crew would result.

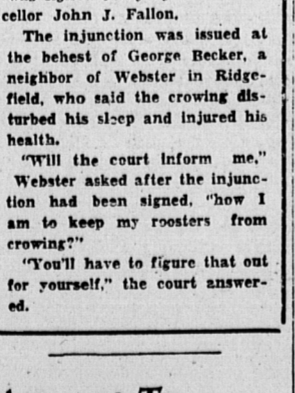
