The evacuation work for the Prince Edward Island hospital, housed at night and day by the Guardian telephones busy answering enquiries from agitated persons who were convinced the smoke was originating from fires in the Province and not from the mainland which was really the source.

The opinion of Dr. J. A. Clark, superintendent of the Dominion Experiment Station, Charlottetown, as expressed to the Guardian early last evening, was later confirmed by the fire department.

The architectural design of the Home will be similar to that of the Hospital Annex. When finished the three-story building will have an accommodation for 20 nurses. In addition there will be classrooms and demonstration rooms for the nurses in training.

Those rooms will be located on the ground floor. The Home, which will be situated on the east side of the Hospital, will have its main entrance facing northwest.

IRELAND APPLIES FOR MEMBERSHIP IN UNITED NATIONS

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Ireland applied last night for membership in the United Nations, becoming the fifth country to take such action.

The application came in a terse cable from Prime Minister Eamon De Valera, who said "Ireland is a British subject state."

Another request was expected momentarily from Iceland. Bids from Albania, Outer Mongolia, Afghanistan and Trans-Jordan already are under consideration by a security council committee.

Mr. De Valera acted under a unanimous vote by the Irish Parliament and said at the time that Great Britain would support the bid.

A British spokesman here last night confirmed that fact and there was no indication of any opposition to the request.

HALIFAX, Aug. 3.—Two Prince Edward Island men were searching Halifax last night for a clue to the whereabouts of their elder brother, now missing over a week.

Refusing to believe their brother Cyrus tumbled from Pier 20 into harbor waters Friday night, Alec Birt and Howard, who arrived from P.E.I. yesterday, are combing the city streets hoping to solve the mystery of his disappearance.

Search for the quiet-mannered City Field employee has spread over two provinces. Last Friday he left work at 5 p.m. and went to a Jacob Street restaurant. Leaving the cafe at 7:30 Birt has not since been reported.

Rumor said the one-time stevedore had been reported along the waterfront, where late Friday night police started dragging operations and were thought to have trapped into the harbor from Pier 20.

Dragging operations were abandoned at noon on Saturday. No clue to the identity of the person—any—who had tumbled to death.

The missing man was described as of retired habits. A brother, Alec Birt, 37, Harcourt St., said Cyrus would not have disappeared except through inadvertence.

While the identity parents of the missing man were reported to be in failing health, a second brother, Howard, arrived in Halifax from Peakes Station, P.E.I., to aid in the search.

The brothers said they believed a clue to their brother's disappearance lay somewhere on the streets or waterfront and announced determination to continue their search.

CHILD'S CONDITION STILL CRITICAL

TORONTO, Aug. 4.—(CP)—Three-year-old Freddie Robinson, critically injured by the axe-and-hammer murderer who caused the deaths of her mother and a brother, was still critically ill tonight, 60 hours after the brutal attack in a central Montreal downtown house, hospital attendants said.

The child's condition is reported unchanged after delicate operation to save her life.

The other children, Joan, aged two years and Donald, seven years, died in hospital a few hours after the attack. Their mother, Mrs. Robinson, 35, died before reaching hospital.

Police said today that Angus Young, 31, who is charged with the murder, was a patient in the neurotic ward of Chastie Street military hospital here.

Not Felt Advisable

INCREASE IN TOURIST VISITORS

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—(CP)—Referring to the tourist boom, visitors to Canada's national parks numbered approximately 400,000 up to the end of July compared with 300,000 during 1945.

Resources in Alberta, 60,873 visitors passed through the national park system into Banff National Park during July, an increase of more than 100 per cent over the same month last year.

July reports from the national parks in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia tell a similar story—substantial increases over July of last year.

Visitors at Prince Edward Island national park increased from 17,000 during 1945 to 21,000 in Nova Scotia, from 5,000 to 7,900.

Justice Minister Makes Statement Re P.E.I. Court

OTTAWA, Aug. 3.—The question of establishing an adequate Court of Appeal for Prince Edward Island was discussed in the House today by W. Chester S. McLure, Progressive Conservative Minister of Justice.

During the discussion of the bill now before the Commons to increase the salaries of judges, the Minister of Justice, Hon. Louis St. Laurent, said that when the first joined the Government he had conferred many times with the Hon. Justice of the Peace, Hon. Louis St. Laurent, who has a brilliant lawyer and knew more about the situation in Prince Edward Island than he could find any other person in the province who would be acceptable to that Province in respect to the judiciary.

"It was not found possible to do that," the Minister continued, "unless we added an additional High Court judge to the Island judiciary."

"It was not felt that it would be proper to do that in view of the fact that there were already three High Court judges there and that the population was of numbers that are sufficiently provided for elsewhere by at most two judges."
