DECLINED TO SERVE UNDER OLD STUDENT

Professor Campbell, of the Montreal Presbyterian College, Tendered His Resignation—Assembly Sensation—Resented the Action of the College Board in Passing Him Over and Appointing Dr. Scrimger as Principal—Church Union.

ST. JOHN, June 5.—Prof. Scrimger was yesterday appointed by the Presbyterian General Assembly, Principal of the Montreal Presbyterian College, and was transferred to the Chair of Systematic Theology from the Chair of Exegesis. It was resolved that the Chair of Exegesis be divided into two departments Old Testament and New Testament and when funds allow a professor be appointed for each. Rev. D. J. Fraser, L. L. D., was appointed Professor of New Testament Exegesis in the same College.

Principal Scrimger is Canadian born, a graduate of Knox College in 1873. In 1874 he was appointed lecturer in the Presbyterian College, Montreal. In 1882 he was appointed as Professor of Exegesis. Professor Fraser is a native of P. E. Island and at present is minister of St. Stephen's Church, St. John.

When Principal McVicar, of the Montreal Presbyterian College, died the Board of Management asked Prof. John Campbell to assume the office of Acting Principal. Dr. Campbell's connection with the College through an unbroken period of 33 years, made this move only natural. It was, however, only a temporary working arrangement. Prof. Campbell is a brilliant student rather than a man of affairs, a bookmaker, not a leader. On the staff was another man who was Dr. Campbell's equal in intellectual vigor and in a lion of very fine administrative ability. A man among men is Dr. Scrimger.

COMPLAINED OF INJUSTICE.

Dr. Scrimger is a former student of Dr. Campbell, and a man of few years. Prof. Campbell's friends were anxious to have the acting Principal made actual Principal, only one dissenting. Prof. Campbell said nothing to this until yesterday morning in the Assembly when the report of the Board came up for adoption. After Dr. Scrimger was declared Principal and the applause was over, Prof. Campbell appeared on the platform looking nervous and ill at ease. His voice was calm and he said he was not speaking in a passion. His friends, he said, thought that an injustice had been done him. He had done his best to serve the Church for a generation and challenged, dared, anyone to show he had not filled to entire satisfaction the duties of acting Principal. He could not stay in a Faculty where a former student was his chief and so laid his resignation of his Chair of History and Apologetics on the table and said his action was final irrevocable.

SILENCE WAS PAINFUL.

The silence that ensued was painful. When David Morrice, of Montreal, rose to express regret for the occurrence, Dr. Campbell rose and went out, and a breeze in the vestibule slammed the door after him. In this connection it is to be remembered that Principal Falconer was a student under Dr. Currie, of Pine Hill, and Dr. Currie is content to abide the new Principal.

PRERACHES TO THE ASSEMBLY.

In spite of a very heavy rain Assembly men in all the non-conformist churches today had good audiences. Rev. Clarence McKinnon of Sydney was the preacher to the Assembly in the morning and Rev. John Pringle of the Yukon, was the same at night. Mr. MacKinnon's subject was "Personal Work." In a simple direct discourse he appealed for active interest in this generally ignored work. His sermon was very eagerly received and the keenest hunter could find nothing to cavil at. Mr. Pringle told the motionless story of the Yukon in his own inimitable way. For over an hour and half a packed house hung on his words.

BUNYAN RELIC.

Original Warrant which Committed Him to Bedford Jail.

On April 23, 1661, there took place the coronation of Charles II., and as a mark of royal clemency prisoners for every offence short of felony were that day released, those awaiting trial dismissed at discretion.

On the 24th anniversary of that day—a day on which John Bunyan would have been released from Bedford jail after his first three weeks' confinement had it not been for the perversity of the authorities, who chose to regard him as a legal conviction, rendering it necessary that a pardon should be sued for—there will be offered for sale at Sotheby's, London, the original warrant under which, in 1674, he was for a third time incarcerated, although, owing to the intervention of the Bishop of Lincoln, in whose diocese Bedford then was, for a period of six months only.

The warrant, signed by thirteen J. P.'s—six baronets and seven esquires—is addressed to the constables of Bedford, and charges Bunyan with having preached or taught at a conventicle meeting or assembly, under the color or pretence of the exercise of religion, in manner other than according to the liturgy or practice of the Church of England. Nonconformity is somewhat freer nowadays!

Rarities by the "tinker . . . who strove to mend men's souls as well as kettles and pans" are to-day the object of extraordinarily eager competition in the sale-rooms. It is worthy of note that apart from important monuments of early printing, such as the First and Schoeffer Estlier of 1459, a copy of which on vellum brought in 1884 £4,950, the highest amount ever paid at auction for a book, and examples by our own Caxton, no printed work save one has realized anything like as much under the hammer as "The Pilgrim's Progress."

It has a wider circulation than any book except the Bible, has been translated into 104 languages, and in 1901 the Nash copy of the first edition, Part I., with the perhaps unique frontispiece of Bunyan dreaming, realized £1,475, as compared with an issue value of 1s. 3d.

As has been said, one other work only apart from those printed in the fifteenth century, has realized as much at auction. This is the First Folio edition of Shakespeare, whose "record" is £1,720.

The sale of the Bunyan warrant promises to be one of the most interesting auction-room events of 1904.—London News.

SATOLLI AT GIBRALTAR.

GIBRALTAR, June 1.—The German steamer Princess Irene, having Cardinal Satolli on board, arrived today. The Cardinal telegraphed friends that he is enjoying perfect health. He was pleased by the attention he received from Americans on board.

MAY SUCCEED LORD MINTO.

OTTAWA, June 3.—A report is current that Lord and Lady Minto will vacate Government House, and leave for England in the second week in October. No official announcement has been made as to Lord Minto's successor, but a definite announcement is expected within a fortnight, and surprise will not be felt if Lord Osohow were to secure the position.


