The senior Saints hit the road this morning for Sackville and their second game this afternoon with Mt. Allison University rugby team.

Detailed all-time Rangers records have been established, making available such knowledge as most goals in one game, most shut-outs in one season, longest winning streak and dozens of other standards equally vital to the hockey fan.

In glancing through the book it is interesting to note on the 1947-48 reserve roster of the Rangers is listed the name of Weston "Bucko" Trainor. The only other Maritime name to appear is that of Sherman White who hails from Amherst, N. S.

Who Made This Year's All Star Baseball Team

NEW YORK, Oct. 22 — (AP) — Only one member of the world champion New York Yankees and not one of the National League pennant-winning Brooklyn Dodgers made the 1947 major league all-star team of the Associated Press picked by 233 baseball writers throughout the United States.

New York Giants, Cleveland Indians and Boston Braves, none of whom finished higher than third, each placed two men on the team which showed a National League complexion, with six representatives from the senior circuit as compared to four from the American.

The Giants were represented by Johnny Mize at first base and Walker Cooper behind the plate. The Indians donated their fine keystone combination of shortstop Lou Boudreau and second baseman Joe Gordon.

The Braves placed third baseman, Bob Elliott, and lefthanded pitcher Warren Spahn. Joe DiMaggio of the Yankees, Ted Williams of Boston Red Sox and Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh Pirates made up the outfield while Ewell Blackwell of Cincinnati Reds won top honors among the righthanded pitchers.

American League, who led the no-nonsense batting department, drew the most support, polling 209 out of a possible 233 votes. DiMaggio was close behind with 207. Mize was third with 189, followed by Boudreau, 177; Blackwell, 158; Cooper, 141; Kiner, 137; Spahn, 115; Gordon, 113; and Elliott, 59.

Boy Represents Babe Ruth At Funeral

LOWELL, Mass., Oct. 22 — (AP) — The mourners of Brother Gilbert today numbered important men in many fields and one small boy, there to say good-bye for a friend who couldn't.

Frank Haggerty, a freckle-faced 10-year-old, knelt at a funeral mass with notables of church, baseball and business and said his own prayer, and one on behalf of Babe Ruth—the sports discovery and long friend of the Xaverian religious brother, who died Sunday at 62.

The mass for the man who first saw possibilities in Ruth was celebrated at St. Peter's Church, with sports leaders such as Eddie Collins and Joe Cronin of Boston Red Sox in attendance.

Ruth himself was ill in New York and couldn't get a doctor's permission to attend the funeral.

So today, in baseball parlance, young Frank Haggerty batted for the Babe.

The boy had written Babe from his home in Danvers, Mass., and asked if he could go to the mass for him. The Babe wired the boy "Go and God bless you."

Expect Russians To Compete In Olympics

LONDON, Oct. 22 — (AP) — Some of Britain's highest amateur athletic sources predicted today that Russian athletes will compete in the 1948 Olympic Games here, ending a 38-year snub of the quadrennial sports classic.

"It looks like they are going to come in," said one of these sources.

Despite official silence from Moscow on Olympic plans, the Russians have been doing the spadework to compete since the end of the war.

They have joined at least five international sports federations—football, wrestling, weight lifting, basketball and swimming—and are clobbering to join about 10 more.

To receive an invitation to the Olympics, the Soviet Union must also organize a Russian Olympic committee and ask for recognition from the International Olympic Committee scheduled to meet at St. Moritz, Switzerland, Jan. 30 to Feb. 8.

In joining five of the 23 international federations, the Russians have made three standard requests—that a Russian be elected to an office, that Russian be an official language and that Fascist countries be ousted. These requests usually have been rejected or tabled and the Russians have joined anyway.

If they compete in the Olympics, sources here said, their chances of scoring some victories would be good although in competing for the first time since 1912 they will find the competition tough.

Meanwhile, preparations for the 1948 games are reported well advanced. The problem of feeding athletes on British rations is considered solved. An announcement will be made soon as to who will donate the properties and meat.

U. S. Imports Invade Eastern Canada Gridiron

TORONTO, Oct. 22 — (CP) — The imports from the United States invaded Eastern Canada gridiron teams in full force this season and, while they didn't turn the Canadian game topsy-turvy, the majority are shining well enough to earn their keep and that extra buck or two.

With former U.S. college stars and big-league professionals well to the van, a total contingent of 34 lined up with the east's 10 senior teams, a Canadian Press survey shows. That compares with the 17 who tread their hand at the amateur game — as played in Canada — last season.

It's 16 less on the whole than would be allowed by Canadian Rugby Union residence rules, relaxed last season to help the game recover from a wartime setback, but five of the teams have the full quota of five U.S.-imports apiece.

The unbeaten Hamilton Wildcats and the second-place Ottawa Football Club — also have five U.S. stars. Toronto Balm Beach in third place, have four, the second-place Toronto Indians one and the fifth-place Windsor Rockets three. The Sarnia Imperials, all-Canadian team outside of Argos, have yet to win or tie a game.
