ALBERTA CLAYS VALUABLE ASSET

TORONTO, Feb. 14.—At a meeting of the Canadian Institute, Joseph Keele of the geological department, Ottawa, gave an interesting talk on Clays of Canada. To the average man a clay bank is not so alluring as a gold mine or a silver prospect in Cobalt, he said, and people have been slow to realize the immense commercial possibilities of the various clay deposits.

The three prairie provinces have almost no timber or stone for building and each year sees millions of bricks imported from the United States. Yet in Manitoba, Alberta and Southern Saskatchewan, are found immense beds of clay quite suitable for making brick, fully as good for building purposes as those brought in from the south. For lining the coke ovens in the Alberta coal district, blocks have to be brought in from Pennsylvania state or by sea from Scotland around Cape Horn, while in British Columbia a fire clay is to be found from which these blocks could be made equally well.

MISS RUSSELL TO LEAVE STAGE IN BEAUTY'S CAUSE

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—Is the musical comedy stage to lose the perennially beautiful and youthful Miss Lilian Russell? That is the question that agitated Broadway yesterday, and in quarters that accepted the report as true the gloom lay thick as a London fog.

Miss Russell's friends have heard that she will abandon the spotlight permanently for the equally lucrative lecture platform. "How to Live a Hundred Years" will be the subject that Miss Russell will talk upon, and she will begin a long tour of the principal cities at Orchestra Hall, Chicago, February 24.

Just now Miss Russell is recovering from a rather severe attack of grip, contracted a week ago, following her return from Los Angeles, Cal. She is at her home, West Eighty-ninth street. When in California Miss Russell prepared her lecture and also spent a good deal of her time before the Kinemaolor picture camera.

KING CANUTE'S CHILDREN WHO WERE DROWNED

LONDON, Feb. 14.—Two tiny coffins were recently found in a monastic burying ground in Peterborough and have been placed in Peterborough Cathedral. One was two feet six inches in length, the other two feet eight inches.

They are said locally to be the coffins of the twin children of King Canute who were drowned in Whitlesley Mere as they were crossing to be educated in Peterborough Abbey.

ST. JOHN MAN HIER TO IMMENSE FORTUNE?

BOSTON, Feb. 14.—James T. Bustin, of James T. Bustin & Sons, dealers in wall paper, paints, etc., in the square at Watertown, trolleyed into Boston looking for some news of Archibald, sometimes called Hugh Watson. All that Mr. Bustin wants of Mr. Watson is to place him in immediate touch with \$1,000,000.

The money is in a bank in Cuba. Watson was formerly of St. John, N. B. If he is still alive he is presumed to be an octogenarian. So far as Mr. Bustin knows the million dollars is a regular million and the bank in Cuba is a regular bank. Said the Watertown man: "All my information comes in a letter from relatives in St. John and all that they know in their turn is that a Cuban bank is advertising for information concerning Hugh Watson, who seems to have disappeared from the face of the earth, but who has a fortune on deposit down there that now amounts to \$1,000,000. The Watson family of St. John or more properly, of Long Reach, a little above St. John, were relatives many years ago one of these Watsons, Archibald, disappeared. That was some years prior to the civil war. When Archibald went away he came back well dressed and apparently well fixed. After a visit of several weeks he dropped out of sight again. Just before the civil war he wrote to St. John from Indiana announcing that he had been married. The Boston papers and lawyers are trying to find the missing St. John man.
