THE TOWN accounts for the past year are now ready for the printers. Among the items of interest are revenue from C. T. A. fines \$1000 less \$19.60 expenses. The statement shows that whereas in previous years there has usually been an overdraft of considerable amount in the Bank besides a very large amount of uncollected assessments there is this year over \$8000 in the Bank to the Town's credit, \$600 of which is bearing interest. (This after having paid last year's overdraft of something over \$1000.) The uncollected assessments amount to only \$200.15 as against \$3136.83 last year. The showing in collection no doubt due to the bye-law recently passed authorizing the clerk to publish the name of the defaulting rate-payers.

Pte. Chappell's Death.

R. Wilson Smith, the Star's special correspondent with the first Contingent, makes the following reference to the death of Pte. Chappell, of Moncton:

A couple of days before Private Chappell, of 'G' Company, had been taken ill with tonsillitis and removed to the hospital. On Tuesday he was a little better, and the surgeons removed his tonsils, and he appeared to be getting better. On Wednesday morning he became suddenly worse, and about eight o'clock breathed his last. This sad occurrence threw a heavy gloom over the whole camp. The deceased was very popular with the members of the company, and all with whom he came in contact. He was buried at eleven o'clock on a little mound just outside camp lines. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Fullerton, and the men of 'G' Company acted as pall-bearers and firing party. The comrades of the deceased in 'G' Company erected a stone monument over the newly made grave.

Laborers From States.

Amherst, January 18.—(Special)—This morning 500 laborers passed through here en route from Boston to Sydney, C.B., to work on the Iron and Steel Works there. This is in contradiction to the statement made by several of the shareholders of the company in Montreal, who stated that none but Canadian workmen would be allowed to work at Sydney in the new works. These men are all citizens of the United States. About 300 of them are Irish, some are German, some negroes. They are all engaged as laborers to work at \$1.25 a day and are guaranteed board at the rate of \$3.50 per week. It is said here in defence of bringing in aliens that it was impossible to get Canadians to work for such a day's wage as \$1.25. As there is no house accommodation the men will have to live, for the present at least, in tents.

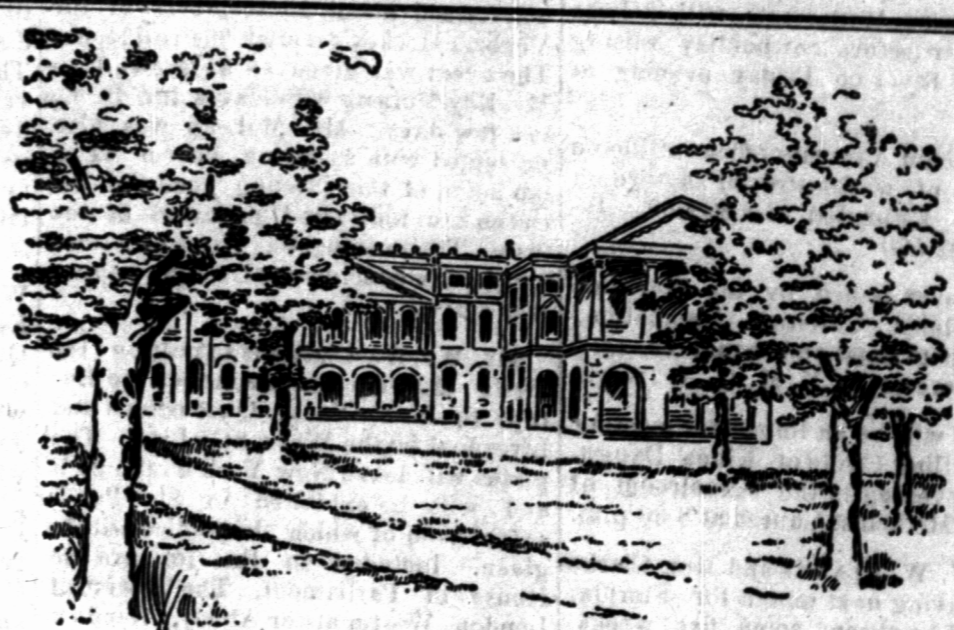
Gas Preservation of Food.

By the newly patented process of Herr F. W. H. Grass, of Berlin, animal or vegetable substances are preserved by exhausting the air from the receptacle containing them, then impregnating them with an inert gas—such as hydrogen, nitrogen, or carbonic acid—at any desired pressure, and finally sealing up hermetically in suitable receptacles. Liquids may be treated as well as solids. The process is expected to become industrially important, for it is adapted to every kind of perishable material, including meats, skins, veget-

ables, flowers, cream, milk, whey, etc. The liquids are restored to their original condition by heating or boiling.

Rice For India.

The Calcutta correspondent of the Times says the Burmese rice crop has broken the record. Over 2,020,000 tons will be available for export to foreign countries. Burmah is also able to supply a practically unlimited quantity to the Indian famine districts.
