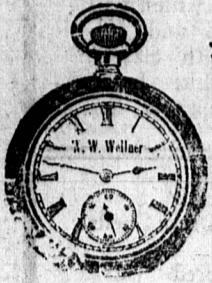

THE death took place in Quincey, Mass., recently of Mrs Daniel F. Finner, daughter of Malcolm and Mrs. MacDonald, Dover, P. E. I.

THE Rev. Jas. Carruthers, New Glasgow, N. S., and formerly of Charlottetown, will occupy the pulpit of the Presbyterian church, Mulgrave, during the summer holiday months.

Mrs. NELLIE ELLIS died last Wednesday at the residence of her son, E. P. Ellis, Petitoctiac, after a lingering illness of cancer. She was 78 years of age, and a native of P. E. Island, but has resided there with her son for a number of years.

CHIEF of Police Tingley, Moncton, well known here, is said to have under consideration an offer to go on the road for a well known commercial house and will probably accept unless the council grants the increase in salary recently asked for.

The following racing dates have been arranged on the maritime circuit in 1905:—Springhill—June 30 & July 1, Moncton—July 7 & 8, Sussex—July 12, Woodstock—July 14 & 15, St. John—July 26 & 27, Springhill—August 30 & 31, Moncton—September 4 & 5, Amherst—September 14 & 15, Chatham September 9 to 13, Fredericton—September 20 to 27.

GLoucester fishermen who have returned from the south, where they have been fishing this winter, report striking immense schools of mackerel, the first of the week off the capes of Virginia. Rough weather has been reported in middle Atlantic waters recently, and when it moderates it is expected that some good catches will be made.—Halifax Herald.

W. A. MURPHY of Hopeton has purchased from George Stewart of Keppoch 10 milch cows being of Jersey and Guernsey grade. It will be remembered that the milk from Mr. Stewart's herd tested highest of the 150 patrons sending to Hazelbrook cheese factory. These will be quite an addition to Mr. Mutch's already large herd, the milk of which is being used for his city trade.

REV. E. S. BAYNE preached and moderated in a call at McLean's church, Whyconough, on Thursday, the 6th inst. The all was in favor of Rev. D. W. McLean of Strathalbyn, P. E. I. It was unanimous and hearty. It is hoped that this large and important congregation which has now been vacant for 12 months—ever since the demise of the Rev. Alex. Ross—will soon be again settled. Our people there have had very little service all winter.—Presbyterian Witness.

The Springfield, Mass. conference of churches, an organization of Protestant denominations, is being dissolved through the withdrawal of Baptists and others on account of an attempt by some of the ministers to admit Spiritualists, Unitarians, Universalists and Christian Scientists. Rev. W. W. Weeks, pastor of the Highland avenue Baptist church, who lectured here some years ago, formerly of Moncton, is one of the revolvers. In a statement he declared he would belong to no "mongrel union." In all, six Baptist churches withdrew.

The death took place at Miltown Cross on April 6th last of Catherine McEachern, beloved wife of James Bears of that place. Contracting a cold a few months ago, it settled on her lungs and in spite of the best medical attendance, and a husband and sister's tender care, she passed away at the early age of 27 years. Deceased was a daughter of the late Simon McEachern, Alliston. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband, four small children, a mother, two sisters and three brothers, who have the sympathy of all in their sad bereavement. The funeral took place on April 8th, to Brooklyn cemetery, where her mortal remains were laid to rest. The pall bearers were John Bears, Henry Campbell, Noah Campbell, Mal. McKenzie, J. Matheson, Wm. Dryden.

MONTRÉAL and Quebec are striking for good gas at a reasonable rate. A correspondent of the Halifax Herald writes: In view of the fact that other cities, in Canada and elsewhere, that have been getting their gas at a lower rate than Halifax, are endeavoring to get this necessary article at a more reasonable rate, I think it is about time something was done in this matter here. In Montreal, I understand, the city council has refused to extend the gas company's franchise on a basis of \$1 per 1,000 cubic feet, and even the city of Quebec is agitating for a reduction of the present rate of \$1.50 net. We in Halifax, as you are aware, are paying \$2.50 (with a discount for cash of 20 per cent—being \$2 net cash.) The New York Herald says: "Gas purchased at 32 cents and sold for \$1 suggests a variation of an old query: 'How would you like to be the gas man.'"

THE Halifax Chronicle says that G. A. Sanford & Sons of that city will this week erect a beautiful church tablet in Christ Church, Dartmouth, in memory of the late Lieut. J. C. Oland, Jr. The base is of red Tennessee marble, surmounted by a tablet of polished statuary marble, with the Canadian emblem—the maple leaf, on which is the word "Canada," in a scroll. The inscription on the tablet is as below: "Sacred to the memory of John Culverwell Oland, jr., L. L. B., Lieut. 3rd. Regt., retired. He served in the Boer war of 1899-1902, as a Lieut. 2nd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment, and as a Lieut. in South African Constabulary. Died Dec. 2, 1904, from illness contracted during his South African service; aged 28 years, 8 months."

**THE TUNNEL.**

**Father Burke Supplements his Market Hall Speech by a Word and Gives New Information.**

DEAR GUARDIAN,—I quite intended asking in my speech the other night those unthinking people who telegraph matter butful to the Province abroad, to forbear in the future. I am now impelled to do so through your columns on account of a letter just to hand from Ottawa. They are from high sources and friendly ones. The writers are pained deeply at the exhibition of pettiness recently made here. I cannot do better than cite their words:

"With reference to the same subject which would be more unfortunate than the enclosed clipping from the Free Press of this city. I know nothing of its exactness, but I am sure the result will be to largely discount the happy result of your mission. I cannot think of any better way of defeating the Island's purpose than the use of such language in the mouth of one who to the outside world at least is regarded as a responsible person. And next to the man using such unfortunate words, or possibly before him, in the injury to be done the Island, is he who spreads them over the Dominion on the wires." Here is the clipping:  
DEBATE ON ADDRESS CLOSED.

Talk About the Reputation That Came to Ottawa.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 7.—(Special.) The debate on the address closed last night. Premier Peters, in answer to the Opposition leader's question, why the Government did not supplement the delegation that went to Ottawa recently on winter communication said this delegation was irresponsible and not representative, and not united in their demands. The Premier said he would send a delegation in due time to present the whole question in a proper and business-like manner.

I may say that such telegrams and worse have appeared in the Halifax press from Charlottetown and some in the Star of Montreal. The object may have been to discredit the Delegation. That cannot be done. But they are creditable in the extreme to the evil source whence they emanate. Surely, those people have had enough of that sort of thing now.

I have assurances from authoritative circles at Ottawa, under date of 12th April, that the new ice-breaker will come at once and the tunnel be seriously considered and advanced apace. The whole of Canada is converted to it and it must come in a comparatively short time as soon as all possible in the circumstances. The feeling aroused all over the country and the case we were able to make, in our humble and united way, at Ottawa, has convinced the Administration that it is a vital issue and must be met; and it must be said for the Administration of the day, that they are inclined to be just to our Island province and fully understand now what physical connection means to us in prosperity; what the want of it entails of misery.

And the engineering concerns of America are all a-lame to take up the tunnel asan investment. The mail brings another proposition under date of New York, April 12th, a paragraph of which reads:

"I may state that I have completed the arrangements with one of the largest financial institutions in America where by they guarantee, under contract, to finance the building and equipment of this tunnel provided the Dominion Government will guarantee the bonds."

The writer does not say what percentage is asked but seeks assistance for a franchise. The firm is a strong one and Hugh John Macdonald of Winnipeg is given as the Canadian reference. My views on this matter are well known, but the receipt of so many offers to build the tunnel as a business venture, and Mr. Hane's bona fide offer, shows that it is now a practical undertaking beyond any doubt.

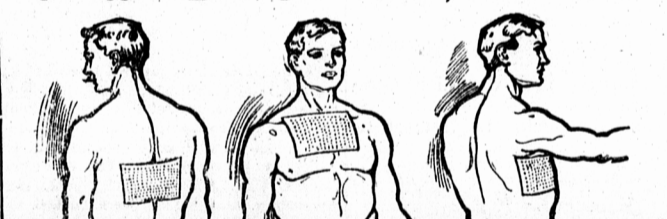
