Big Offer to Financial Wizard

BOSTON, July 31—A new York banker has offered Charles Ponzi, the financial wizard, who pays 50 per cent on investment in 45 to 90 days, a cool \$10,000,000 for his business. Ponzi declared regarding the offer of the New York banker, whose name he refused to divulge, that he had not yet reached a decision. He will hold another conference with the banker in a few days. If he does not accept he said he will resume his operations in Boston and other cities where he has branch offices, as soon as the auditors of the District Attorney's office complete their investigation of his books, for he displays a blithe confidence that they will find nothing illegal in his transactions.

THE FUTURE OF CANADA'S SHIPPING

Continued from Page Five. Since 1914? Out of the almost fabulous profits of such an industry and of earnings of a large fleet, the Dominion could have done much to discharge her war debt. The possession also of a large and thoroughly modern mercantile fleet would have yearly kept in Canada millions that in the form of carrying charges, have gone abroad. It has been estimated that in 1913 Canada paid to other countries over \$26,000,000 for such service. To this sum, already large, should be added the loss in population made up of those who were deprived of employment in seafaring and kindred activities, have gone abroad to find opportunities for other parts.

Respecting The Future

Possessing an extensive fleet, equal to about \$270 per capita, one-half of which is overseas, it would seem as though Canada were capable of supporting a dominant merchant marine, to say nothing of the possibilities that lie in competing for a portion of the carrying trade of other countries. But to forecast the future in such matters is, at the present, impossible. It is hoped, however, that the national pride developed through a realization of what Canada has done and is doing in building ships and sailing them on the high seas, will do much to maintain the position she now occupies and even to improve it. Canada can never progress to be self-sufficient until Canadian commerce is carried in Canadian ships. If the Dominion does not retain her present shipbuilding industry and build up her marine she will serve merely as the refueling ground for the United States navy and the United States mercantile marine.

Disagree over Municipal Tax

The Prime Minister and other members of the Government have always fully and promptly paid Federal Income Taxes it is stated. The Prime Minister and some of his colleagues have paid this tax under protest, awaiting the decision of the courts in the test case which will be submitted.

TO MANUFACTURERS, WHOLESALE AND RETAILERS

Notice is hereby given to all concerned that Returns, accompanied by remittance of LUXURY AND EXCISE TAXES, must be made as follows to the local Collector of Inland Revenue from whom any information desired may be obtained.

RETURNS OF LUXURY TAX must be made on the first and fifteenth day of each month.

RETURNS OF JEWELLERS' TAX, MANUFACTURERS' TAX, AND SALES TAX must be made not later than the last day of the month following the month covered by the Return.

RETURNS FOR TAXES IN ARREARS must be made forthwith, otherwise the penalty provided by law will be enforced.
