CITY COUNCIL'S REGULAR MEETING

Held Last Night—Debentures to be issued for \$75,000 for Electric Lighting Plant.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night at 8 o'clock in the City Hall.

Communications were read from the Secretary of Canadian Municipalities asking for opinion re the next meeting of the Association and the appointment of Ex Mayor Cook of Ottawa as representative in that city.

Mayor Kelly thought all reasonable encouragement should be given the company, Coun. Hooper was in favor of exemption but suggested that the matter lay over, Coun. Prowse said the city derived much benefit and favored exemption.

On motion it was carried unanimously that Mr. Tanton's correspondence be returned without comment.

A committee composed of Councillors Hooper, Riley and Stewart was appointed to prepare a bill for the enabling the city to issue \$75,000 debentures for an electric plant and other bills for exemption from taxation of the Milk Company, etc.

The assessors were ordered to make their regular yearly returns.

Coun. Hooper gave notice of introduction of assessment by law and for allowing discounts.

Coun. Hooper moved, seconded by Coun. Prowse, that the insurance on the Market House be reduced from \$20,000 to \$7,000, the amount saved to be put towards a sinking fund for Market House debentures.

Mayor Kelly thought people who had purchased debentures should be protected.

Councillors Rogers, Reddin, Riley and Alley opposed the resolution and Councillors Prowse, Hooper and Stewart upheld it.

The motion was defeated on the above division.

The City Marshal and Police were instructed to collect the dog tax.

The City Clerk was authorized to call for tenders of 200 feet board measurement 3x6 spruce; 50,000 3-in. hemlock; 90,000 2-in. hemlock; to be delivered on Pownall wharf.

HOCKEY LEAGUE HOLDS MEETING

And Awards the Hockey Championship to the Victorias—Abegweits will Appeal to the M.P.A.A.A.

The P. E. I. Hockey League met last evening and were in session till about half past two this morning.

After reading of minutes a number of bills were passed.

Communications were read from the Secretary of Canadian Municipalities asking for opinion re the next meeting of the Association and the appointment of Ex Mayor Cook of Ottawa as representative in that city.

It was decided that the protest in the second game of the league series between Victorias and the Crystal-Pioneers at Summerside be allowed and the game was ordered to be played over next Friday or this night week at Summerside.

Play off game fixed for Feb. 24 between Abegweits and Victorias and which it was claimed the Abegweits defaulted by absence in Amherst was awarded to the Victorias and the trophy and championship was then given to them.

The league series was thus figured out: L. B. McMillan gave notice of an appeal to the Maritime Province Amateur Athletic Association on the decision of the League that the Abegweits defaulted to the Victorias on Feb. 24.

FIFTY THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN

Twenty-five Thousand Russians Killed—Jap Losses Much Less—Japan Will Claim Port Arthur, Protectorate of Korea and an Indemnity—Russians Rearch Tie Pass.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 13.—(Special).—Russia's grand army is slowly gathering behind the fortifications of Tie Pass which were built as a refuge before the battle of Liao Yang and is feverishly engaged in the work of reorganizing and strengthening its lines.

The main body has already completed its retreat and the rear guard is falling back, slowly keeping in touch with the pursuing Japs.

Kuropatkin admits that fifty thousand of his men were taken prisoners and it is officially reported that over twenty-five thousand were killed.

When Emperor Nicholas summons his council today he will be prepared to tell them that the Japanese will accept peace on conditions of holding Port Arthur, a protectorate over Korea and an indemnity.

The magnitude of this disaster to the Russian arms is making the people insist on peace.

The Japanese losses did not exceed those of previous battles, Kurok's army having lost not more than five thousand.

MOCK PARLIAMENT.

Deputy Speaker took the chair at 8.15. The attendance was not as large as usual owing doubtless to the meetings of the Mock Parliament having been intermittent.

Mr. McPhee, member for Sydney, in a brief speech, from the Opposition benches caustically criticised the Government's policy. Fluent and augmentative, his maiden effort was warmly applauded.

On division the amendment was declared lost, the main motion then carried, and the engrossing of the address ordered, and its presentation arranged for.

The second reading of a bill to amend the Dominion Election Act 1900 was introduced by the Honorable Minister of Justice, Dr. H. D. Johnson.

The House was moved into committee of the whole. A lively discussion ensued as the amendments were read clause by clause. Eventually the bill carried.

Previous to adjournment the Leader of the Government announced that the time being so near when the full period of five years would have elapsed the Government felt it due to now place in His Excellency's hands the resignation of the Ministry.

The next evening will see the new Premier and his colleagues on the Government benches.

CANADA'S AGENT IN SOUTH AFRICA
