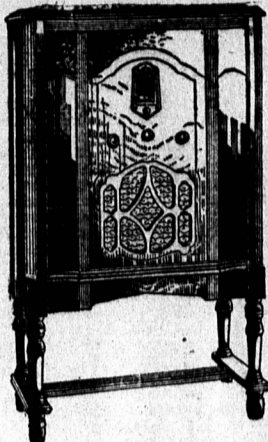

## Is Ramsay MacDonald Nearing End Of His "Reign" As Prime Minister?

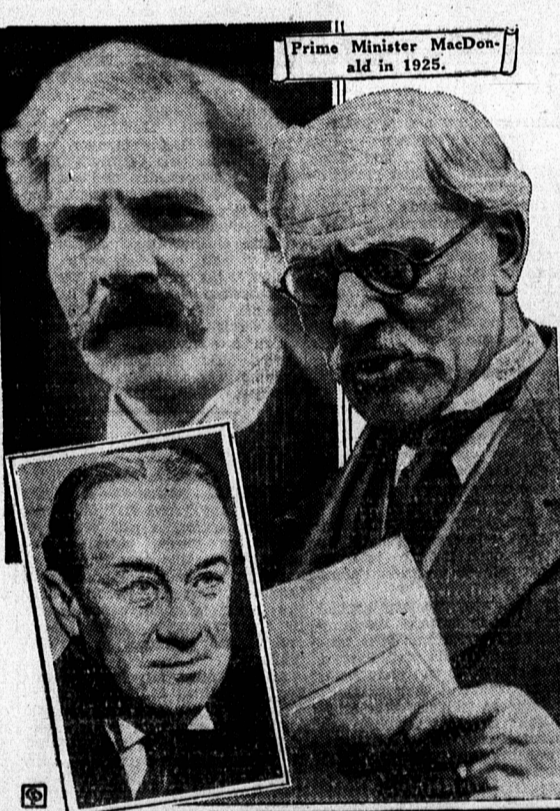
### Hostility To Once Popular Figure Rises Over "White Paper"

LONDON, March 23.—"I'll resign whenever I feel I can no longer pull my full weight in the boat." Such is the first public avowal of J. Ramsay MacDonald, prime minister of the national coalition cabinet governing England, to the mounting storm of criticism against him arising from Britain's populace. "Nuisance" and "renegade" are some of the names that have been hurled at him.

The British Labor party has openly accused his now famous "white paper," which blamed German re-armament for England's big increase in army and navy appropriations, as a menace to world peace. They demand its withdrawal.

Termed a renegade by his former Labor party companions whom he left to head the conservative dominated coalition ministry in 1931, Prime Minister MacDonald finds himself "the politician" nobody wants, and according to observers, Stanley Baldwin, leader of the British Conservatives, is finding political "marriage" with the silver-haired 69-year-old Scotsman increasingly embarrassing.

**Discomfiture Applauded**

Several weeks ago, MacDonald, possessor of one of the best platform speaking manners in England was hooted to silence by jeering listeners when he tried to defend the government's policies. Then, when the heckling audience observed his enraged discomfiture, they proceeded to applaud.

It is a far cry from 1930, when J. Ramsay MacDonald, as prime minister of the British Labor government, received unquestioned obedience and respect from the Socialist rank and file.

But for MacDonald, the "Lossie-mouth (Scotland) loon," unpopularity is nothing new. Since 1898, when he joined the Labor party and stood for election to parliament on a Socialist platform, MacDonald has felt the roar of public disapproval. His youthful pacifism infuriated an electorate glowing over England's imperialistic victories in the Boer war. Not until 1906 did he win a seat in the House.

Opposing England's participation in the world war, MacDonald resigned from the party when his fellow members "went patriotic." And throughout the remainder of the conflict MacDonald, who passed his time writing, studying and preaching peace was a reviled and harassed man.

**Mentioned for Cell in Tower**

Even his Socialist friends, who overnight had discarded their peace-loving tendencies, clamored for his "hide." A cell in grim London Tower, where spies were jailed prior to their execution was mentioned as a suitable residence for MacDonald by many.

With the armistice, pacifist MacDonald found himself warmly welcomed, however, in a war-weary world. The Labor party in the 1922 election returned 142 members to parliament, and J. Ramsay MacDonald became the honored leader of "his majesty's opposition."

And when the Conservative government, led by Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin asked Britain to approve its naval expansion in 1923, MacDonald, the pacifist, triumphed to head the first Labor government in England's history.

**Paris Company**

Since then MacDonald has slowly weaned himself away from the Labor-Socialist ranks. Gossips say he liked the swirl of nobility, the favor of King George, the need for power "at any rate." The names of Lord and Lady Londonderry are prominently mentioned as those now friendly to the prime minister.

Thus in 1931, when the second Labor cabinet found itself face to face with an economic crisis, Prime Minister MacDonald said farewell to his party by forcing an election that virtually wiped it out before the Conservative onslaught.

This MacDonald, heading a coalition ministry composed of Conservatives, Liberals, and some Laborites who swung along, found him-
