Stewart Tallies Twice As Bakery Team Trim Quakers; Superiors Upset Holmans

Two third period goals from the stick of Gordon Stewart gave the Stewart's Bakery City Hockey League entry a hard-earned 4-2 victory over the Quakers Saturday night at the Forum in the first game of a double header.

For two periods the teams battled on even terms with little to choose between them. The 2-2 score at the end of the second was a fair indication of the play and but for two penalties to the losers in the third session the game might easily have gone into the overtime.

Quakers drew first blood midway through the first period when Jimmy Gillan accepting MacLennan's pass at the line drilled one behind Murley in the Bakery net. The ultimate winners lost little time in tying it up; taking Reg Whitlock's passout from the corner Mark Arsenault beat Gillis clearly two minutes after the Quakers' score.

Boll was the hero of the piece with two goals and two assists, Thoms running him a close second with two markers but no assists. Charlie Conacher broke his scoreless streak of eight games when he tallied Leafs' first goal.

Rangers And Americans Win Sunday Games As Maroons & Red Wings Tie

NEW YORK, Dec. 22—New York Rangers, paced by the bald patriarch, Ching Johnson, downed Boston Bruins 3-1 in a National League hockey game at Madison Square Garden tonight. Less than 3-1-2 minutes of the first period had gone when the burly Johnson skated up the side of the rink, passed to Frank Boucher and then guided Boucher's return into the net for the first goal of the night and his first score of the season.

For the rest of the night Johnson kept up his torrid pace, spilling racing forwards and speeding away with the puck when things looked bad near the Ranger goal. Babe Siebert scored midway in the first period to bring the Bruins on even terms but Cecl Dillon lured Tiny Thompson from his post with a fake shot, then slipped one in to send the Rangers into the lead again in the second. Earl Seibert raced all the way up the ice in the final chapter to score the Rangers' third goal, whipping it shoulder high by Thompson.

Only three penalties were called in the game that was witnessed by 13,478 paying customers. Conacher Gets Tying Goal. DETROIT, Dec. 22—A goal by Lionel Conacher, veteran defenseman, in the final minute of the third period, gave the Montreal Maroons a 2-2 overtime tie with the Detroit Red Wings here tonight in a fast National Hockey League game before 10,000 fans.

The tying goal climaxed a furious, five man Maroon drive and ended when Conacher slapped the puck past goalie Norm Smith in a wild scramble. Marty Barry gave the fast traveling Wings the lead with a solo goal early in the first period. Hooley Smith tied the game up in the third period on another pretty unassisted effort. Late in the period "Bucko" McDonald, wing defenceman scored on Wally Killera's pass, and then Conacher sent the game into a fast extra period with his counter. The game was a well played battle, with only four penalties being imposed, two against each team. Smith for Detroit saved on 32 Maroon shots while Beveridge, in the Maroon cage, had but 19 stops.

CHICAGO, Dec. 22—Nels Stewart's goal late in the overtime period tonight gave the hustling New York Americans a 3-2 victory over Chicago Blackhawks in a fast National Hockey League match played before 10,000 spectators. Pee Wee Wiseman's solo goal in the first minute of the second period put the Americans ahead, but Paul Thompson's score midway of the same session tied it up. Tommy Cook scored during the 12th minute of the third period to give the Hawks a lead that looked safe. However, Manager Red Dutton of the Americans, who had served out a 10-minute misconduct penalty which started in the second period, and ran over into the third, scored the tying goal 30 seconds before the finish of the regulation time.

RUNS TWICE IN ONE DAY. LONDON—Noble, eight year old steeplechaser, showed his class by running twice in one day at Haydock Park. In the first race he was brought down by another horse when halfway round the course. None the worse for that mishap he was ridden safely two hours later but was beaten into second place by forty lengths.

ARTHUR NEWTON'S BOOK. CAPE TOWN — Arthur Newton, world famous South African distance runner, has written a book which has just been published. In it he recounts some of his experiences and tells how he had to readapt his style when attempting long distances. When training for 50 mile races he ignored certain methods used in preparing for the 26 mile distance, he said.

HYLTON PHILIPSON DIES. LONDON—One of England's outstanding athletes in the 80s, Hylton Philipson is dead at 69. Popularly known as "Punch" he gained most fame as a cricketer but was also a fine tennis and racquet player. Philipson stood out as a wicket-keeper and for many years had no superior in amateur ranks. He played in four test matches against Australia.
