COLUMBIA'S FISH INDUSTRY

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 3.—British Columbia's salmon pack totalled 1,290,960 cases in 1922 valued at \$10,109,927. This was an increase of 687,203 cases over the 1921 output and a gain value of \$4,175,983, according to a report compiled by the provincial department of mines and fisheries.

The total value of the output of British Columbia fisheries during the year, including fresh canned, cured, or otherwise prepared, the report shows, was \$18,872,833. This was an increase over the previous year of \$4,919,163, or 36 percent.

An interesting feature of the report was the fact that whaling operations were suspended in 1921 were resumed in 1922 and produced an output valued at \$158,814.

Total capital invested in the fish industry of British Columbia, the report shows, was \$19,951,571. Of this \$6,765,827 represented vessels, net, traps, piers and wharves and invested in canning and curing establishments. The number of persons engaged in fishing operations and in canning and curing establishments, it is shown, was 14,930.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—The use of silver in the motion picture industry and amateur photography, and the great demand for silver jewelry are responsible for a growing demand of such huge proportions that Robert Linton, President of the North Bitter Mining Company, predicts a shortage of the metal in the future.

In a statement on the subject Mr. Linton declares that 5,000,000 ounces of silver are used in photography each year. This is the largest single factor in the increased demand in the United States.

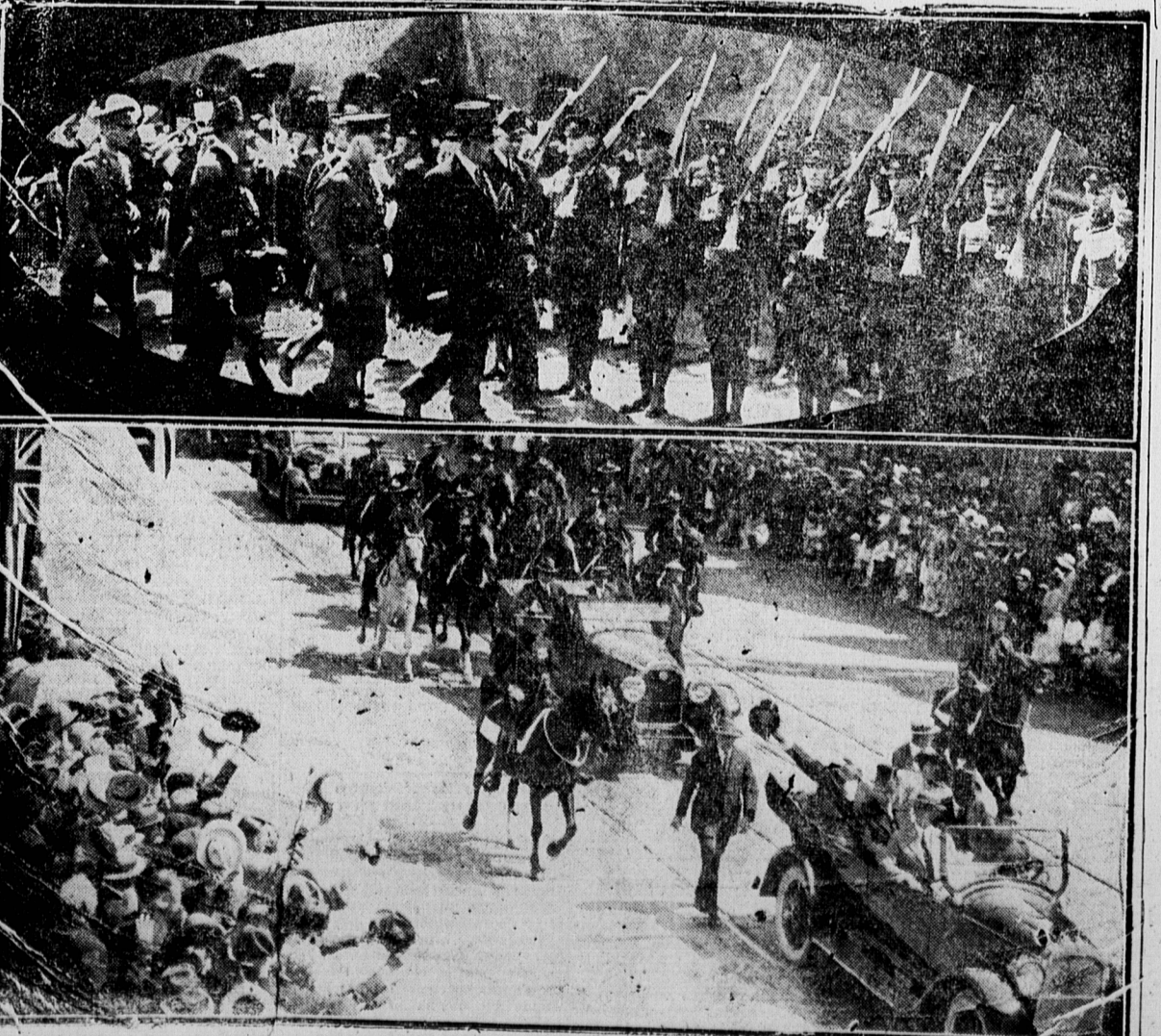
