"The Trade," too, is fighting a most aggressive campaign, and is making the battle line everywhere right around the globe.

The annual report of the "French Wine Exportation Association" reads: "Our action assumed the most diverse forms; drawing up of tracts and pamphlets, and their distribution throughout Canada, press publications and conferences, the furnishing of funds at the right moment, etc."

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Moirs President Declines Nomination

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, March 21-President Frank Lewis declined a nomination for re-election to the board of directors of Moirs Limited today after the annual general meeting of shareholders refused to approve his report.

The new board—six members instead of eight—consists of J. C. MacKeen, Vice-President; W. K. McKean and W. B. Proctor, all re-elected; D. R. Turnbull, J. Fred Fraser and C. W. Stairs, new members. They will meet tomorrow to elect a new president.

Retiring members are Frank Lewis, C. J. Burchell, K.C., L. V. Smith and D. E. North. Mr. Lewis became president for the bondholders two years ago when the bonds were defaulted.

The two years' operation of Moirs Limited since its re-organization shows that the operating loss which in 1932 was \$308,000 has been changed to an operating profit in 1934 of \$47,000, before losses at Bedford shoop mill, he stated in his report.

A net operating surplus of more than \$18,000 this was shown, the Bedford loss being \$29,000. The company had been saved from a "serious position," the president said, but it required "further strengthening."

A motion that the report be approved was seconded and a show of hands indicated 25 for to five against; but Marshall Rogers called for a poll. When this was taken, it was found that D. R. Turnbull and J. C. MacKeen had the largest number of proxies and on their opposition the motion was declared lost.

NEWARK, N. Y. Airport, March 22-Weird and muffled voices that identified themselves as belonging to the spirits of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Wilbur Wright, Raold Amundsen and others were heard last night in the darkened interior of a cabin plane soaring high over New York City.

For the first known time in history, a spiritualistic seance was held in the cabin of an airliner. As the plane roared over Floyd Bennett field a voice which said it was that of the late Floyd Bennett waited eerily from the two trumpets in the cabin.

"More fantastic than death itself," came the voice ascribed to the late Sir Arthur, thin and unearthly in quality. "There wasn't a ray of light in the long narrow cabin, an eager spiritualist in each of the 14 seats. Newspapers had been tacked over the windows and the green silk curtains drawn tight.

The voice from the Aluminum Trumpets continued. "Recoil to lady Conan Doyle our talk with John Gladstone (who was a passenger on the plane) our chat in Washington when he first suggested this experience 12 years ago. It said 'tell her I am looking after her interests.'"

Lady Conan Doyle in a letter from London several months ago said: "I may tell you that we have been in constant communication ever since his dear physical presence left us."

Sir Arthur, famous as the creator of the astute and imperious Sherlock Holmes, was a firm believer in spiritualism during the last years of his life.

Miss Maina Tate of New York City was the "direct voice medium" through which, the spiritualists there said, the strange voices were heard.

Miss Tate sat near the centre of the cabin. Beside her in the aisle was cut glass bowl containing a small quantity of water. She placed the trumpets in the aisle, also.

"Somebody start a song," said Miss Tate, soon after the plane took off. Her soprano voice was the first heard. Then others picked up the tune. It was "my bonnie lies over the ocean." It was then the first voice was heard.

Silence followed. Only the steady roar of the plane was heard. "Everybody sing again," said Miss Tate.

"If you hear a voice please speak to it," she urged.

The song this time was "Jingle Bells, Jingle Bells, Jingle all the way."

Voices waited again from the trumpets—eerie and weird. The Trumpets was absolute.

"I felt a hand pat my shoulder," said one of the men. That was while a voice which claimed Horace Greeley's spirit was speaking.

After this, clearer than the others, came the voice of the late Aviator Lincoln Beachey, which stated Wilbur Wright is here with me, standing right here beside me, and so is Floyd Bennett."

The Ronald Amundsen voice told in answer to a question, how Amundsen died in the frozen arctic wastes, a mystery that never has been solved. "We became lost in the fog over trackless wastes of ice," said the voice. "It was just as well that I went I did. My work was done."

"I have been down with Byrd (rear admiral Richard E. Byrd) in little America, watching over him," said the voice in conclusion.
