A MASTER OF HIS ART
 A characteristic story of Sir
 Christopher Wren the famous archi-
 tect is still told in the town of
 Windsor where he erected the
 Town Hall in the Royal Borough.
 When the charming little build-
 ing, designed with the architect's
 most skill, was finished, the
 Councilors met him on the spot
 to inspect and criticise. Several
 pointed out that the pillars in the
 lower part of the building did not
 appear stout enough to support
 the Council Chamber above.
 Whereupon Sir Christopher called
 for a ladder and a sheet of paper.
 Mounting the ladder he slipped
 the sheet of paper through an im-
 perceptible space that lay be-
 tween the upper portion of each
 column's capital and the ceiling
 above. Mystified but content, the
 Councilors are said to have waived
 all further objection.

WHITE CORAL HOUSES
 All the houses in Bermuda are
 white. They are built of the white
 coral rock of which the whole
 group of Islands is composed. As
 first taken from the quarry the
 stone is so soft that it may easily
 be cut with a knife but exposure
 to the air soon hardens it. When
 a Bermudian wishes to build him-
 self a house he has only to scrape
 away the soil or so soil which
 overlies the rock which is his
 building material. The houses are
 usually roofed with thin slabs of
 coral and the whole finished with
 a coat of whitewash. Many of the
 inhabitants of the island are ne-
 groes, and very black they look
 against the white background of
 their homes. The rich verdure of
 the trees adds its contrasting
 beauty to the landscape.

THE OLD LOG BOOK
 The log book in the early days
 of seamanship was used merely to
 record the speed at which the ship
 was travelling. The primitive "log"
 for reckoning this speed was a
 real literal log of wood thrown
 overboard from the bows. Accord-
 ing to the time it took to "pass"
 the stern—really, of course the
 ship passed it—so fast was the
 vessel travelling. In time the "log"
 was superseded by the present
 mechanical devices, but the old
 word remained. The speeds record-
 ed every hour or so were chroni-
 cled in the "log-book". Gradually
 this ship's diary expanded its
 uses, till today it includes records
 of every sphere of maritime inter-
 est, ships "spoken", atmospheric
 readings, engine room work, and
 so on. A "log" must be kept; it is
 the law.

FAIRBANKS IN "THE THREE MUSKETEERS" TONIGHT

"Doug" Has Achieved the Ambition
 of a Lifetime in the Character
 of D'Artagnan.
 Predictions are being made that
 the screening of Alexander Dumas'
 immortal story "The Three Mus-
 keteers," by Douglas Fairbanks,
 will stand forth in motion picture
 history as an epochal event and
 that it will popularize for all time
 the costume photoplay.
 Productions of this sort, even
 when based on the fictional writ-
 ings of such masters as Dumas,
 have always been considered to be
 in "the danger zone," because it
 has never been established beyond
 question that the American public
 would receive the costume play
 with the same enthusiasm that has
 been accorded features more mod-
 ern in locale and setting.
 It has always been Fairbanks'
 contention, however, that any
 story sufficiently powerful and
 gripping in drama is bound to suc-
 ceed.
 "A popular picture nowadays,"
 said the star, "must be logical; it
 must have comedy and pathos, but
 above all it must be human. Any
 story that is human will succeed
 regardless of whether the players
 wear wigs and short pants or are
 garbed in pyjamas. Drama was
 the same in the Seventeenth Cen-
 tury as it is today. This may be
 the gasoline age of civilization, but
 it hasn't altered human emotions
 appreciably. People still laugh
 and cry and give vent to anger.
 And they are still inordinately se-
 rious. In fact, we progress because
 we are curious. People of today
 wonder if in the olden days kings
 and queens and dukes and lords
 were swayed by the same passions
 and emotions that now rule hu-
 manity. To satisfy in a measure this
 curiosity we have made a celluloid
 reproduction of "The Three Mus-
 keteers," and we have crammed in-
 to it everything that is dramatic,
 instructive, human, amusing and
 entertaining. We have tried to
 twang every emotion in the human
 system, just as D'Artagnan did in
 his memoirs and as Dumas did in
 his great novel."
 The best talent procurable has
 been called upon to help transcribe
 this great story to the aluminum
 sheet. Edward Knoblock, one of
 the greatest writers of contempora-
 ry playwrights, is responsible for
 adaptation, research and costumes,
 while to Fred Niblo goes the honor
 of directing the piece. Niblo, a
 born adventurer, has won distinc-
 tion as a master in guiding the des-
 tinies of this type of play; he is
 said to have no peer. Arthur Edson,
 rated as a genuine lens artist, is
 credited with the photography,
 and is said to have achieved some
 effects which hitherto have been
 considered impossible to have been
 attained.
 In the face of the business read-
 justment that the country has been
 facing, Fairbanks has spent more
 money on this production than on
 any picture he ever before under-
 took, all because he has confidence
 in the vehicle and in the
 amusement-seeking public. "The
 Three Musketeers" is said to be
 the greatest picture of its kind ever
 made. It is ten reels in length
 and cost a million dollars. United
 Artists Corporation is releasing
 the film.
 The above picture will be shown
 at the Prince Edward tonight and
 tomorrow night.

PICTURES WITHOUT PAINT
 A unique exhibition has just been
 held in London of pictures, not one
 of which had been touched with
 brush, pen or pencil.
 The pictures were made up of
 the leaves of flowers and trees,
 pieces of pitch and bark and so on.
 So cunningly have they been done
 that only by a very close examina-
 tion can one tell that they are not
 actual oil paintings of great merit,
 almost every kind of picture, in
 fact, were exhibited. Copies of
 famous old masters done by the
 same process were a feature of
 this novel exhibition.
 The artist who is responsible for
 this new form of "painting" is
 Mr. W. J. King, a civil servant
 whose hobby has been leaf picture
 making for twenty years. Now he
 intends to take it up as a profession.
 "I have never had any art
 lessons," Mr King told a reporter.
 "When I was a boy I wanted to
 take it up, but I had no encour-
 agement. Later on I bought a box
 of paints and taught myself every-
 thing I knew. I became quite a
 good painter in oils, and then, one
 day, I happened to pick up a leaf
 which seemed to me to be sing-
 ularly beautiful in color and design.
 This gave me the idea of using
 leaves to make pictures. Since then
 I have hardly touched a brush."

 colors. Now, I think, I have a leaf
 for every color and shade that an
 artist can want! I collect them,
 press them, and expose them to the
 light until I am quite sure that
