Censure is Meted Out to Power - Latter Makes Feeble Reply to Scotland Yard.

LONDON, Aug. 17. - The British nation yesterday found itself the victim of a hoax of a particularly unpleasant character, when the investigation of the Home Office revealed that the coffin brought from Norway...

The packing case, alleged to contain a coffin and a human body, which on Saturday night was removed by the police from an undertaker's on Waterloo Road...

The government recently made public a detailed statement which had convinced a majority of the people of the groundlessness of many of the published Kitchener myths...

In the meantime the police are looking for Frank Power, originator of the hoax, who seems, for the moment, to have disappeared.

Not in many years has England been so shocked and distressed, for the memory of the great soldier is held sacred in every household in the land.

The Daily Mail declared: "It is a ghastly act thus to exploit the fame of one of the greatest of England's soldiers."

Apparently nobody dreamed of the contingency that the coffin would be the subject of a hoax.

LONDON, Aug. 17. - The disclosure that the coffin alleged to have contained the body of Field Marshal Lord Kitchener was empty appears to have assuaged the British mind to such an extent that interest in the "mystery" has died down.
