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Gasoline Profits To be Regulated

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Unofficial reports have been current lately the government intend to cap the tax of six per cent a gallon on petrol and largely increase the tax on motor vehicles. These reports were accompanied by threats to increase the price of petrol by eight pence per gallon.

A committee under the profiteering act has examined into the question and according to the forecast published in the Herald will report in favor of fixing the price of petrol at 31 pence per gallon. At the same time the government will be urged to invite the league of nations to take similar means in all countries to prevent the exploitation of petrol by producing companies.

Miners Demand Cheaper Coal

LONDON, Feb. 2.—The miners' delegates, when they meet Premier Lloyd George to-morrow, intend, according to report, to ask that the Government reduce immediately the price of industrial and export coal and proceed with the limitation of coal owners' profits, the limitation to be retroactive. They also will demand that the Government take steps to reduce the price of food and clothing to a reasonable basis.

The miners threaten as an alternative to demand an immediate all-round increase in wages, amounting to five shillings daily.

Military Week February 23-28

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—The week February 23rd—28th will be Military Week in Ottawa, and a large number of military organizations will meet here during that time. The big event of the week is the annual business meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association. The last D.R.A. meet was held at Rock life in 1913. This year it will be revived in full force and it is expected in view of the great practice most Canadians have had in shooting, both the annual meetings and the shoot itself will be the greatest in the history of the country. The D.R.A., shoot will, after seven years, be held this year a week earlier than the old date, namely on the week of August 16-21.

The Canadian Artillery Association will also meet February 25th-26th for an annual meeting. Other organizations which it is expected will meet that week, and for which arrangements are now under way are: Canadian Cavalry Association, Canadian Infantry Association, Corps of Guides, Military Medical Officers' Association, Canadian Engineers, Canadian Army Service Corps Association, and possibly one or two others. Arrangements are now under way with the railways to obtain a single-fare rate to Ottawa and return home for all those attending these meetings.

CAMBRIDGE, MASS., Feb. 2.—The discovery of another new star was announced tonight by the Harvard College Observatory, the Nova being discovered in the course of examination of plates taken nearly two years ago. The position was: Right ascension 16 hours, 48 minutes, 24 seconds; declination minus 29 degrees, 27.8 minutes (1900).

Religious Kiss May Be Too Friendly

LONDON, Jan. 29.—In disposing of a divorce action from Stornoway in the Court of Session, Edinburgh, Lord Sands commented on the practice of kissing among church people attending communion in the Highlands says the London Times. It had been alleged by the respondent in the case that she had been kissed by the correspondent as a religious custom.

Lord Sands said the existence of such a custom seemed startling, but it was explained by the fact that it had been the practice for only a mere handful of the adherents of the church to participate in communion, although the communion season was a far more solemn occasion in the Highlands than in the Lowlands. It might be all very well for elderly saints to greet one another with a chaste Oriental religious salute, but mine a different matter when it came to young married women being promiscuously kissed by casual male acquaintances who happened to be fellow-communicants. That extension of the custom was viewed with disapproval by many, but still to a certain extent the custom persisted.

His lordship held, however, that the kissing in the case in question had exceeded religious custom, and he granted a decree of divorce.

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KENTVILLE, N. S., Jan. 30.—Nova Scotia gave birth this afternoon to a new political party. After the convention of the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association was closed, a number of the members and others unattached to any party, gathered to hold a meeting to consider the farmers' platform adopted by the United Farmers of the West and Ontario.

W. O. Creighton, was the chairman and after considerable discussion the following resolution was adopted:

"That the farmers of Nova Scotia assembled in mass meeting form a new political party along the lines of the United Farmers of Ontario and the farmers' association of the West as well as New Brunswick."

The meeting appointed a committee of five to attend the United Farmers' convention in New Brunswick next week.

At a later date a provincial convention will be held either at Truro or Halifax, where the organization will be completed.

Supreme Court

The case of Louise C. Longworth vs City of Charlottetown an action for damages came up before Chief Justice Matheson in the Supreme Court yesterday.

The counsel for the plaintiff were Messrs Johnston and Palmer, and Messrs Martin and Gaudet appeared for the defendant.

This case concerns a property on Longworth Avenue belonging to the plaintiff Louise C. Longworth who alleges that the city in cutting some branches which were claimed to be dangerous to public safety, damaged the trees and marred the appearance of the south side of her property. She therefore sued for damages.

After hearing the evidence of six witnesses for the plaintiff and one for the defendant the court adjourned until 10:30 today when further evidence will be heard.

Montreal Wants Daylight Saving

(Special to The Guardian.) MONTREAL, Feb. 2.—At a meeting of the daylight saving committee of the Board of Trade yesterday it was decided that if no governmental action was taken, efforts should be made with the municipal authorities to secure daylight saving regulations for the city of Montreal and district. It was also decided to communicate with Boards of Trade, Merchants Association and other clubs throughout the country with a view to securing legislation toward daylight saving.
