Maritime Broadcasting

(By JEFFERY J. DINGMAN)

CALGARY, March 20.—Residents of every one of the Maritime Provinces head the special maritime radio concert broadcast especially for their benefit recently by CPON, the radio broadcasting station of the W. W. Grant Radio Ltd., of Calgary, Alberta.

Free peanut tubes were offered to the first five residents of Nova Scotia. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to report to Mr. Grant the reception of the special Maritime concert and already three telegraphic communications have been received saying signals were picked up. All wires came from Nova Scotia, but it is expected that postal communication soon will be received from residents of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island who heard the concert.

The special Maritime Concert from CPON was one of the most remarkable as well as one of the most novel and interesting feats ever accomplished by radio broadcasting station. Besides several excellent vocal, instrumental and orchestral selections, there were several speeches conveying greetings to Maritimeers, messages carried over three thousand miles by the human voice speaking into a microphone.

W. W. Grant and Morris V. Chestnut themselves both natives of the Maritime Provinces, sent messages to their friends and acquaintances in the Maritime Provinces. The annual speech of Raymond Havens, international president of Rotary Clubs, written on the occasion of eighteenth annual international Rotary week, was relayed to the east over CPON for the benefit of Rotarians there.

Accomplishment of such a feat is considered most remarkable, in view of the fact that it was accomplished while atmospheric conditions were not at all conducive to the clear reception of radio signals over such an immense distance. In fact, static was most derogatory to the most satisfactory broadcasting, but in spite of this CPON signals were heard clearly. Radio engineers state that it is many times more difficult to cover such territory on a stated night at a stated hour, with the reaching of a definite location in view, than it is to "freak through distance," it is comparatively easy to cover great distances through this latter method as it by this means that the majority of long distance records are achieved.

Robert Doull, fifteen year old son of Dr. Arthur E. Doull, 34-14 Morris Street, Halifax, N. S.; was the first to report the reception of the concert. This was closely followed by telegraphic communications from H. Brannon, Chebucto Head, N. S. ad W. J. Miller, Duncans Cove, N. S.

Residents of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island who heard CPON's special concert are advised to advise W. W. Grant at Calgary immediately, as only the first five from each of the three provinces, as well as from the Dominion of Newfoundland, will receive free peanut tubes.

Radio that most marvellous science of the age has passed another important and significant milestone in its history. It has reached its distance—annihilating tentacles across the rolling prairies, the towering mountain peaks and great oceans of the world. The day is here when two hemispheres will be linked together in a closer unity through the medium of the human voice, day and night, travelling, swiftly, silently, unseen across immense distances. In this comparatively unexplored field, W. W. Grant and Morris V. Chestnut, natives of the Maritime Provinces have been pioneers, blazing the trail for others to follow.

The latest accomplishment, the broadcasting of a special maritime concert across a distance of three thousand miles, created keen and widespread interest in the Maritime Provinces.

HAUNTED GIRL NOW INMATE OF STATE ASYLUM

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Mar. 20.—Sealed in the deranged mind of an attractive young woman is a tale of a broken engagement, which, in the opinion of physicians, led to her insanity.

Miss Ellen Johnson, twenty-five, is an inmate of Rochester State Hospital victim of a mental ailment believed to be either paranoia or dementia praecox—both of which are forms of insanity in which hallucinations of persecution are suffered. Where the young woman came from or why she came to Rochester, no one here knows.

Fled From City to City.

Miss Johnson, after being detained several days under observation at County Hospital, was adjudged insane by Dr. William J. Gibson and Dr. Robert J. Campbell.

Her removal to the state institution is the end, for a time, at least of fruitless journeying from city to city in an effort to escape the vision haunting her.

According to Dr. Gibson, the physicians learned from Miss Johnson that she has wandered about the country three years, seeking to slude the ghost of the man she jitted.

Saw Shadow Face

On only the subject of the haunting vision and the broken engagement preceding its initial appearance did Miss Johnson talk irrationally, Dr. Gibson said. Discussing other subjects she appeared to be bright and intelligent.

Chances for recovery from paranoia are slim, though sometimes cures are effected, Dr. Gibson said. Prospects for recovery from dementia praecox are even less bright.

Miss Johnson came into attention of authorities here when she showed face that she said had followed her across several states.

TREES AS A CROP

"I like to emphasize with all my strength that the object of a forester is not to protect trees from being cut. There would be no foresters employed in this or any other country if there were no lumbering operations. It is the forester's business to produce wood, and if he can make money in selling trees three inches in diameter he is doing perfectly legitimate business. The guiding principle in forestry is to see that wood-production is continuous for all time; to see that acres that have been cut over shall come up again in commercial trees; that areas having been burned over shall be regenerated with commercial trees; and that waste lands and areas unsuited for agriculture shall be made to bear commercial trees."—Dr. C.
